




The District Conference met in the Institute Chapel for three days of discussion. Northwestern District problems were solved.




The Institute LIFE ...

With a willing mind and a ready hand she did those things which were set before her until a year and a half ago her Heavenly Father called her Home.


May the memory of her short sojourn here impress upon us the realization that to this life of ours we can add no postscript. We must work now—or never!






\mathcal{A} Note to simpson memorial church




"Without in India."






The "Neglected Continent" of several decades ago, is now the "Mission field of the Hour."




Pioneers faced disease, destruction of property, and even death at the hands of Boxers and Communists, yet one hears, "Our God whom we serve is able."

Today our missionaries face the peril and havor of 20th century warfare, but with the old refrain on their lips, "Our God whom we serve is able."

Still some 400,000,000 to be reached with the Gospel. Shall not we enlist as missionaries of praying and giving, *triumphant through faith*, till we, too, may echo with assurance: "Our God whom we serve is able"?




