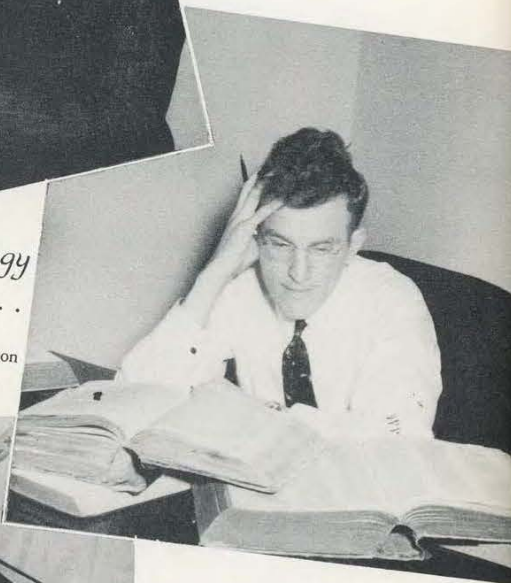

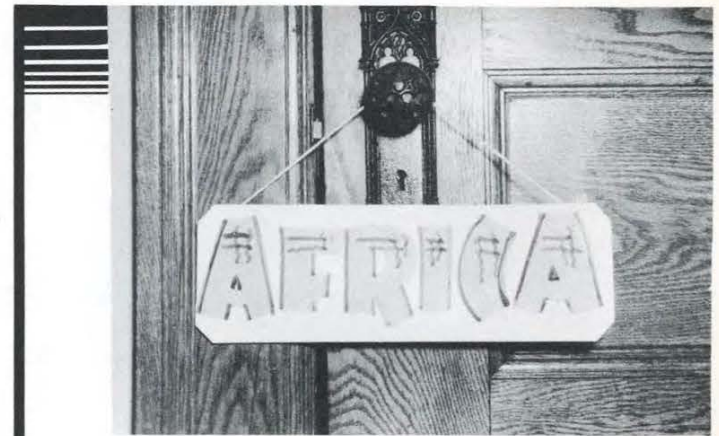
Sign in Men's Prayer Room

M. announces the beginning of "Quiet Hour," a time of quietness before the Lord. Tuesday and Friday evening prayer meetings have become a source of renewed strength. "They that wait upon the Lord shall renew their strength." All hours of the day find the prayer rooms in use.

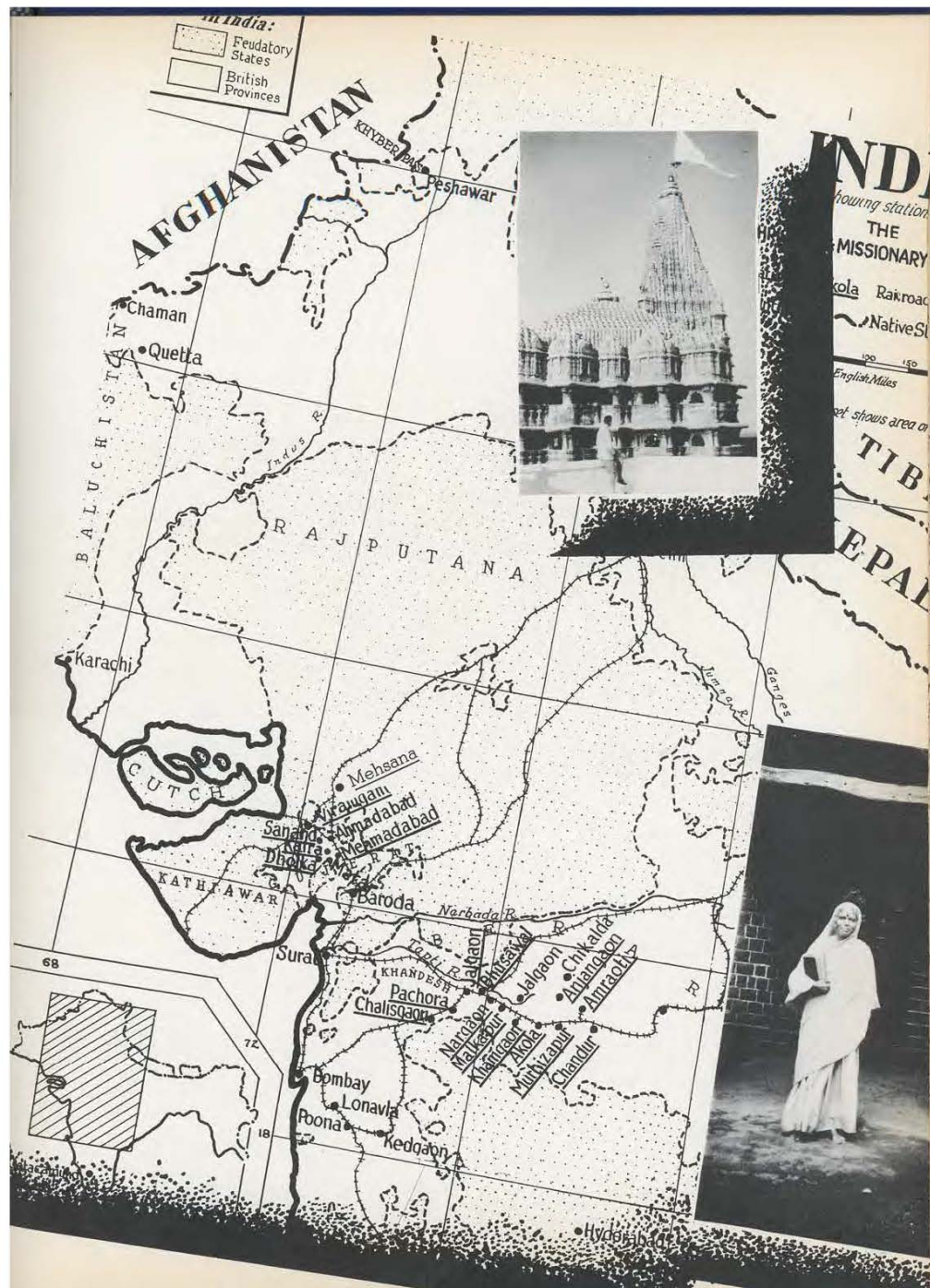

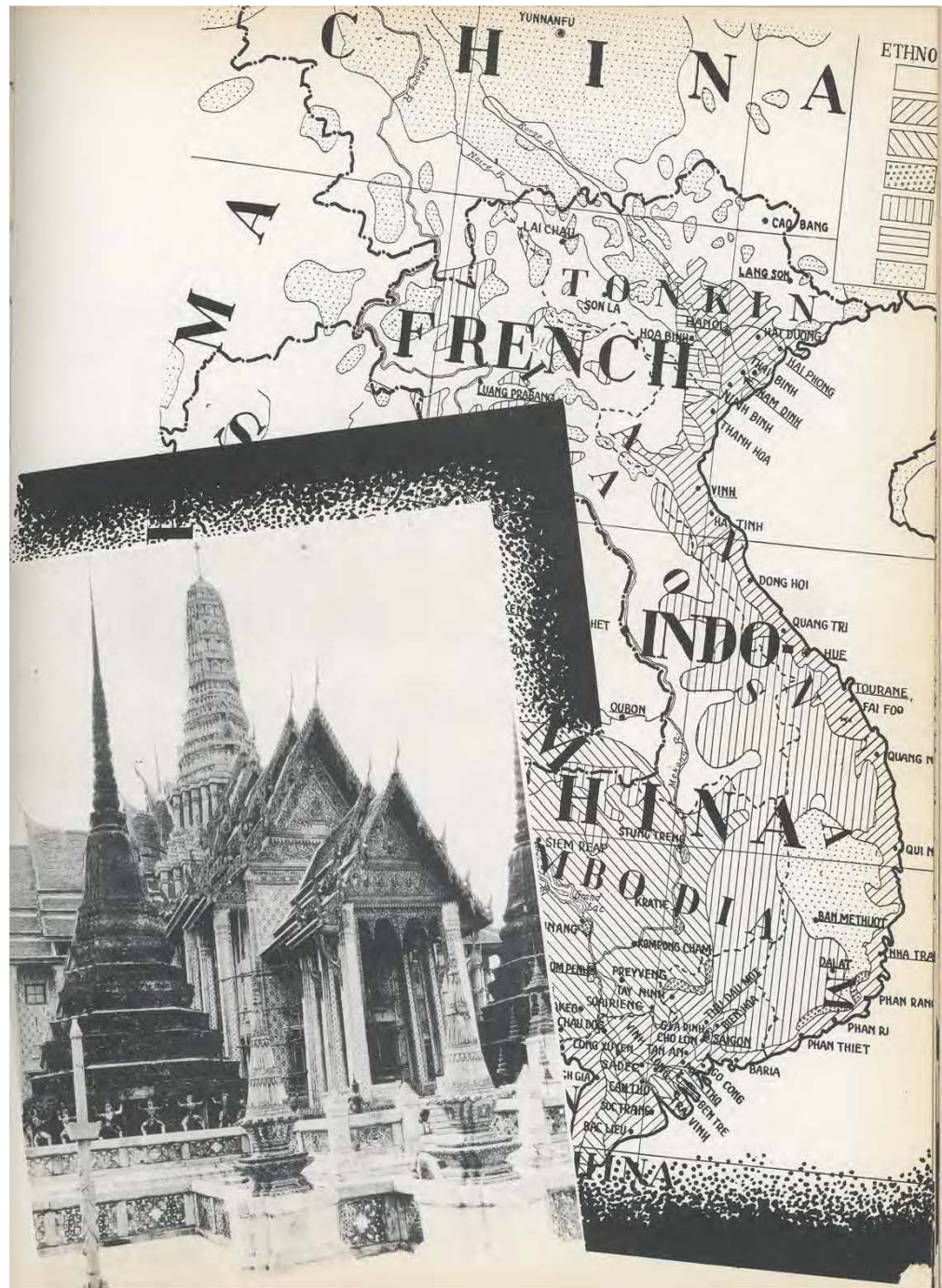

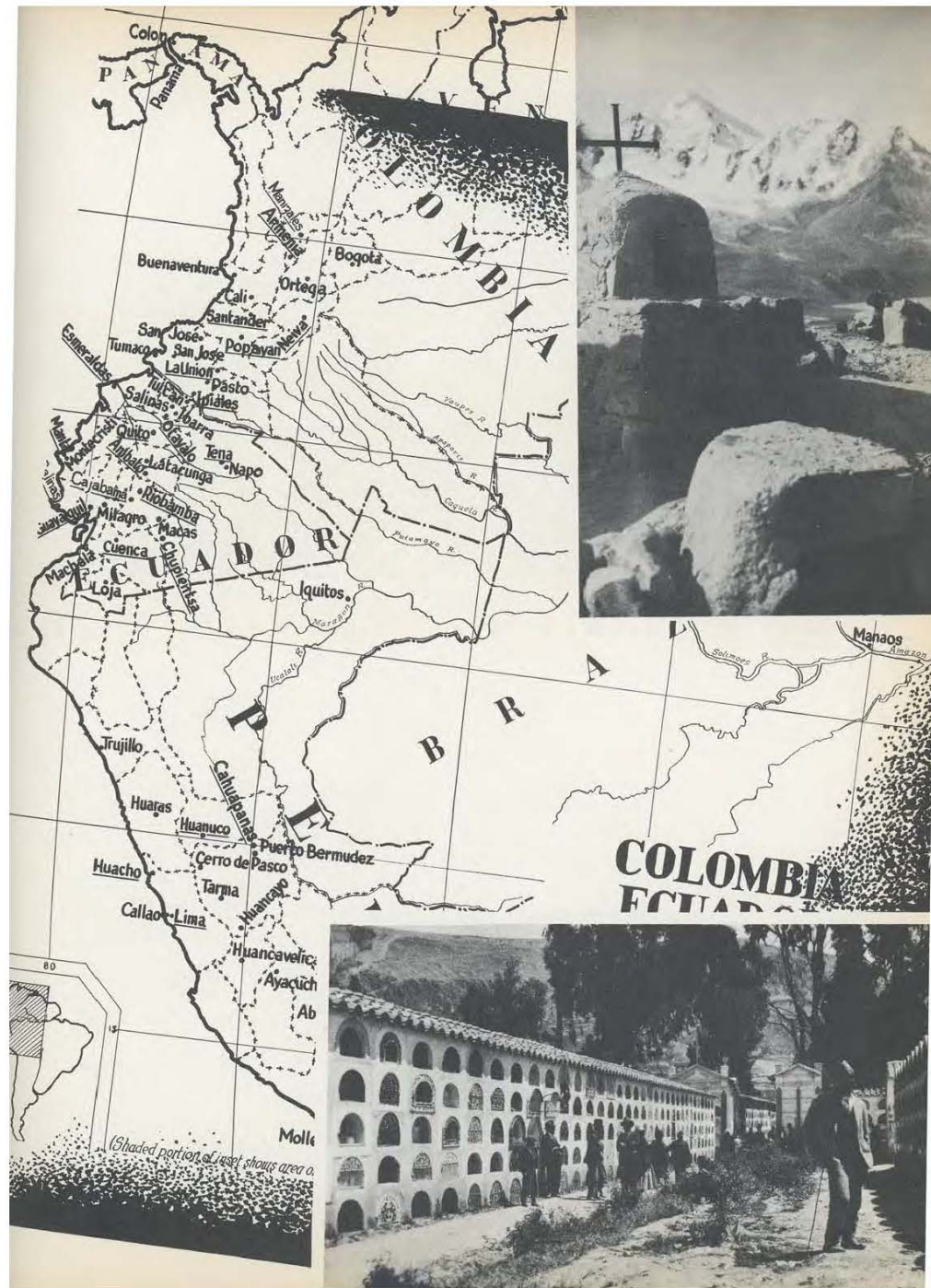
The "Neglected Continent" of several decades ago, is now the "Mission field of the Hour."

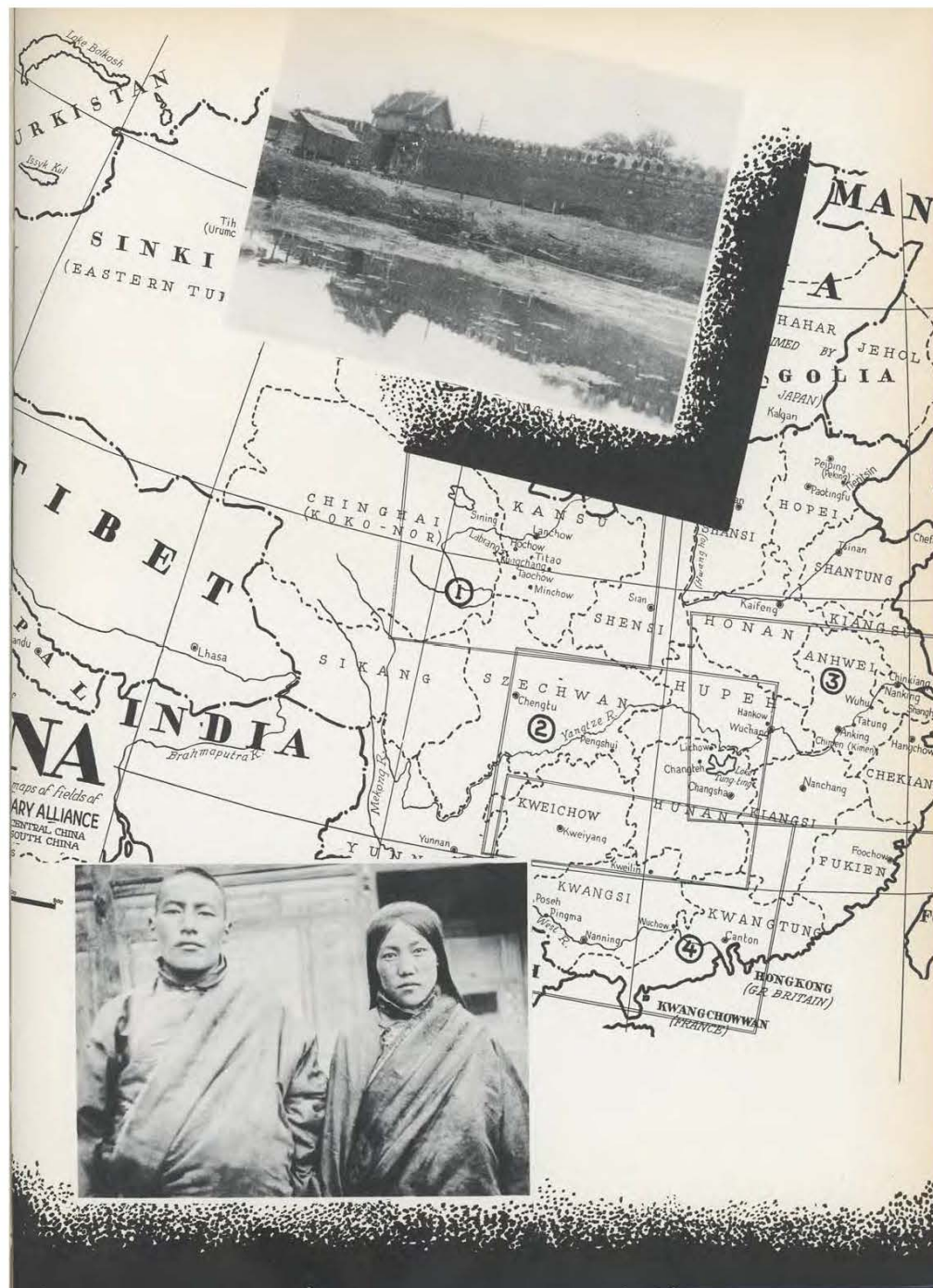

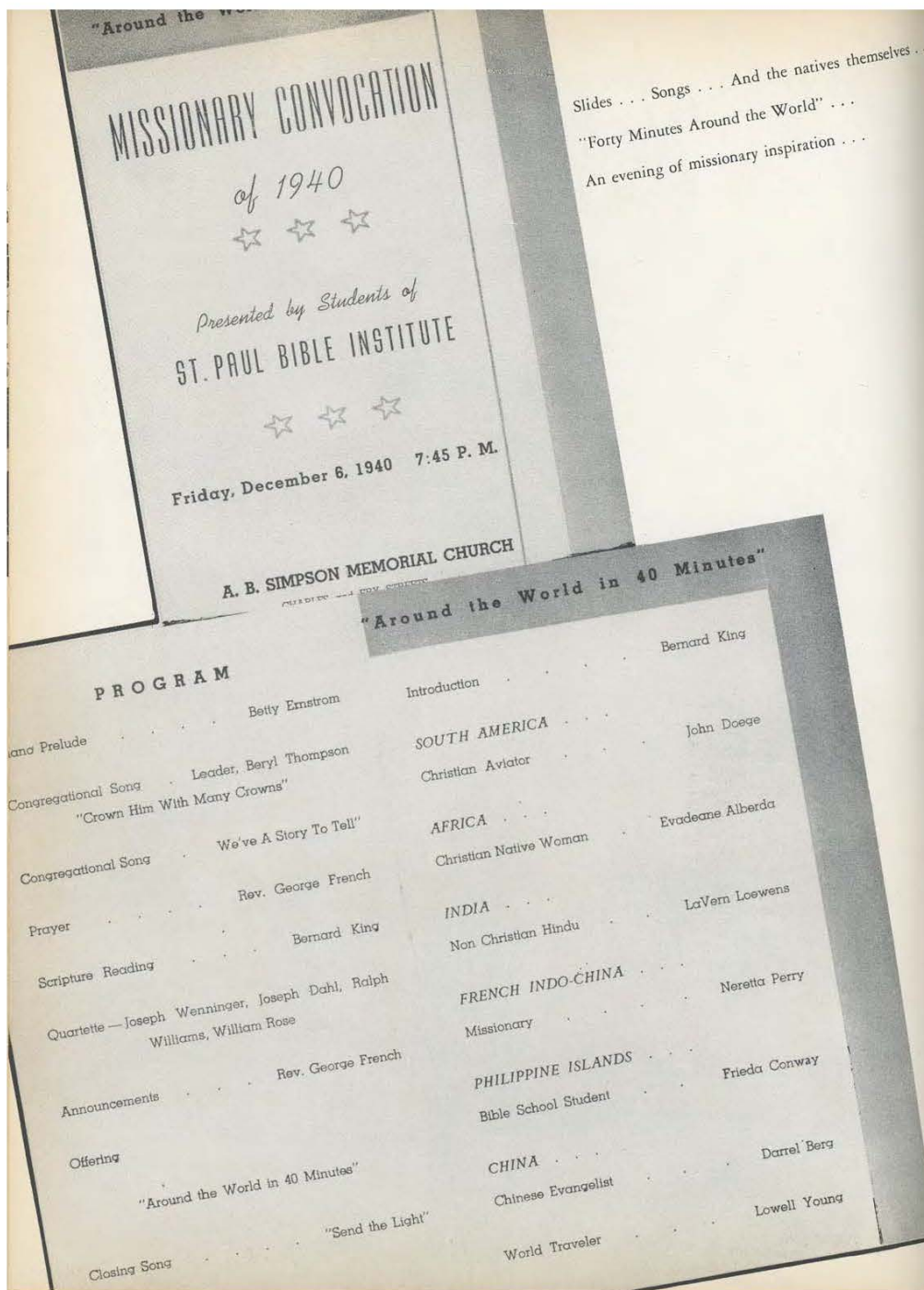
Pioneers faced disease, destruction of property, and even death at the hands of Boxers and Communists, yet one hears, "Our God whom we serve is able."

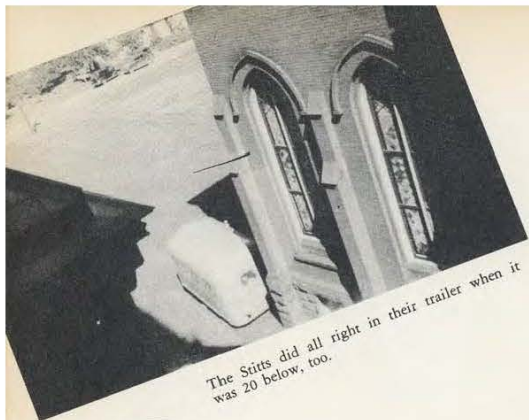
