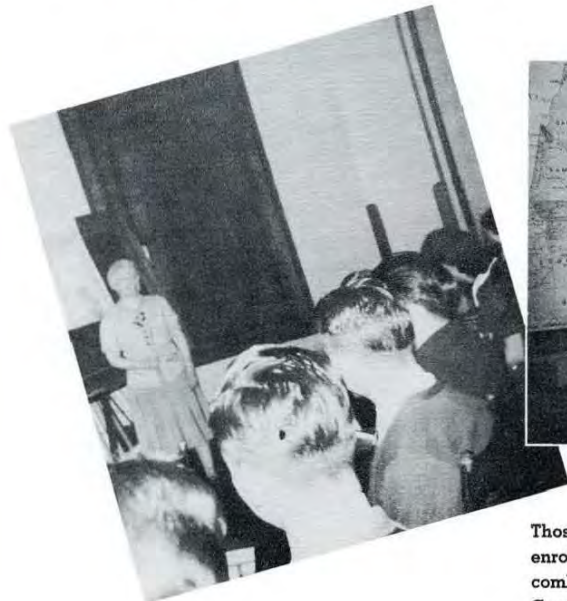
DEPARTMENTS

In 1935 Rev. Edward C. Swanson, who was then President, superintended the move to the present location at Englewood (Capitol) and Hamline. In 1936, the Missionary Training School was incorporated as the St. Paul Bible Institute.

God has wonderfully answered prayer for the Institute and honored it with a total enrollment of over two thousand students. Many of these have scattered everywhere preaching the Word. Eighty-nine graduates have gone forth to proclaim the gospel on foreign soil. Others are preaching the Word in the homeland. The unsurpassed ministry of this God-ordained Institute is written in bold letters across its twenty-five years of history.



Under the anointing of God, the St. Paul Bible Institute of the Christian and Missionary Alliance, has grown from a nucleus of four students in 1916 to its present enrollment of over two hundred.

From this beginning in the home of its founder Rev. J. D. Williams, the Institute moved the next year into a new building on Sherburne, where it continued for eighteen years.



Rev. Ezra S. Gerig was the first student to enroll and graduate from the Institute. After serving in several C. & M. A. pastorates, he is now pastor of the Church of the Great Commission, Portland, Oregon, of which he was the founder. Mr. Gerig has just completed twelve years of radio ministry.

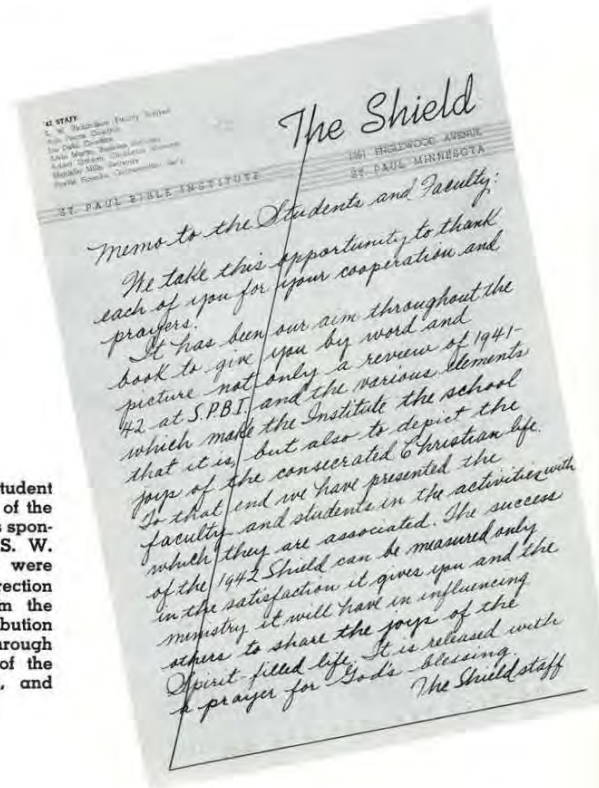
