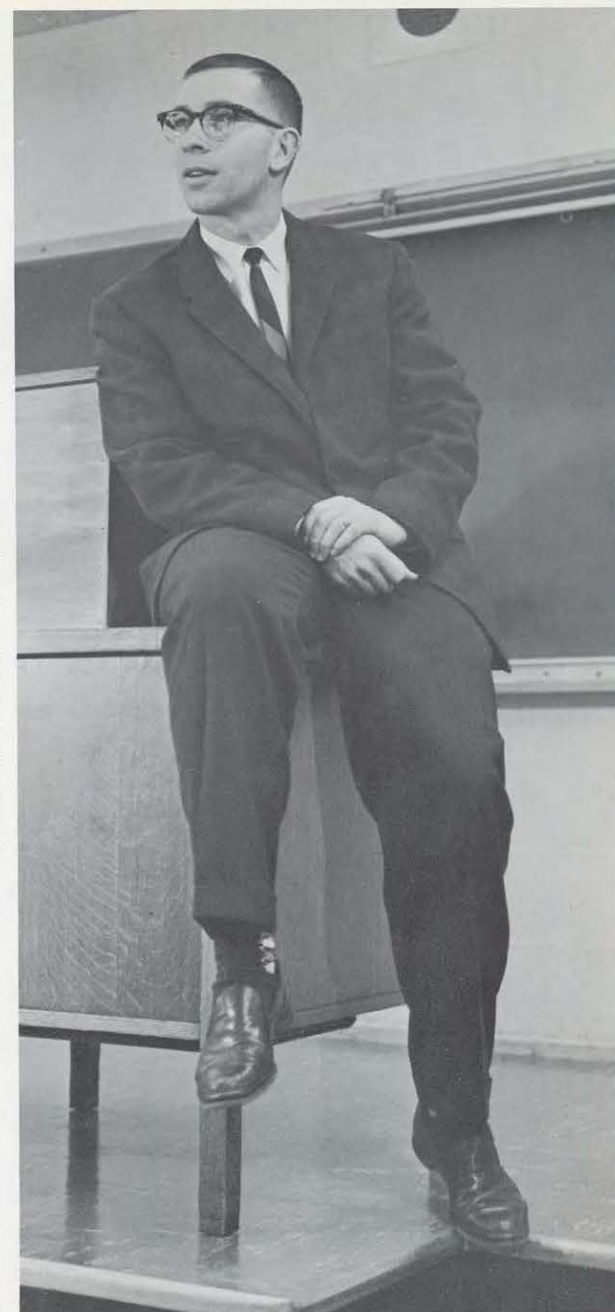


Mr. Mason,

Christian Service Offers Wide Opportunities

Christian Service is a vital part of life at St. Paul. Rev. Charles Shepson, Director of the Christian Service Department, has as his aim, "to have every student participate in Christian Service every week." This is an enormous task but Miss Darlene Brown, Christian Service Secretary, has endeavored to reach this goal.

Some of the areas of service where students were able to minister this year were rest homes, missions, Youth For Christ clubs, release time classes, and boys and girls clubs. Every Sunday students could be found all over the Twin City area in various churches teaching Sunday school classes, directing primary or junior church, leading the various youth groups, or providing special music. The Christian Service Department also sent students to churches outside of the Twin Cities. This year our students travelled into six states presenting programs of music and testimony.

The Christian Service Department did much to widen the evangelical outreach of the school and its students. It provided effective training and experience for future Christian workers.

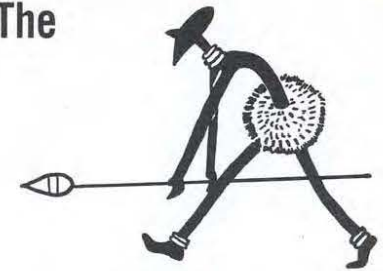

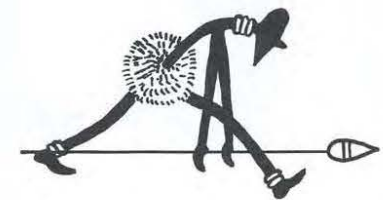

Campus Missionary Conference in its Fourth Year

7:45 a.m. Wednesday, October 23, 1963, introduced a time of spiritual searching, blessing, and victory for the students of the St. Paul Bible College. This was the beginning of the Fourth Annual Campus Missionary and Deeper Life Conference, the theme of which was "The Heathen Rage."

What did this conference mean to the students at St. Paul? It meant many things but among the most important it was a time of listening, learning, and decision.

Each morning for the three days of the conference the students attended workshops, films, and panels of their choice. The topics ranged from "Stone Age Women" to "Missions and the Ecumenical Movement." The speakers included missionaries, missionaries' kids, missionary candidates, nurses, students, pastors, teachers, men from the Alliance headquarters in New York, members of the St. Paul faculty and

the Jaffray School of Missions, a college president, and a district superintendent of the Christian and Missionary Alliance.

This conference afforded one of the best opportunities of the entire year to learn about the missionary enterprise of which the Christian and Missionary Alliance is a part. It was indeed a time of listening and learning.

Deeper Life meetings were held in the evening. The speaker for these services was Rev. Philip Armstrong, Executive Secretary of the Far Eastern Gospel Crusade. His provocative and heart-searching messages caused each student to stop and evaluate his life to see if it was vitally united to Christ. It was during these evening meetings that the students not only listened and learned but also made decisions that would affect their lives and the lives of others for the years to come.

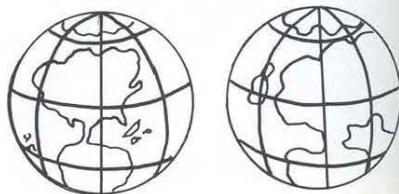

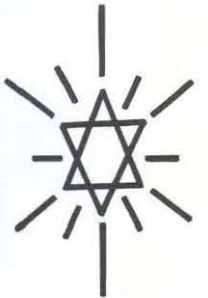
Christmas Time

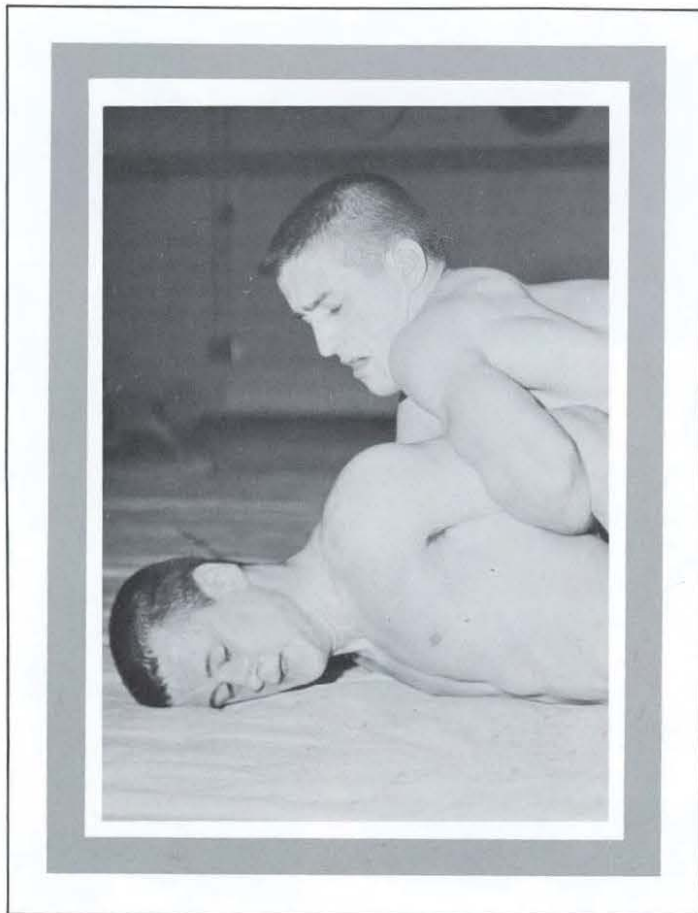

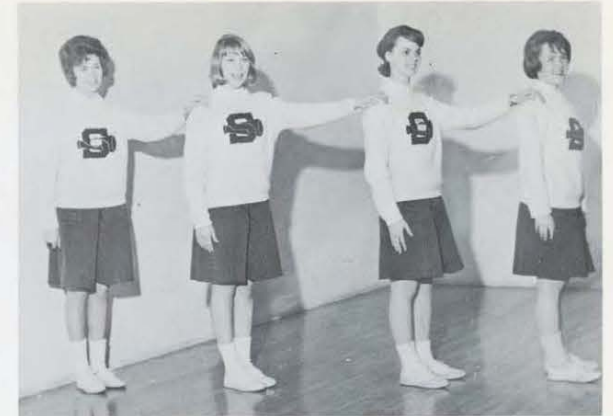

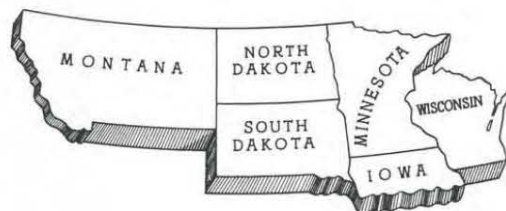
