





STRAIGHT AHEAD ... St. Paul Bible College is moving forward to improve the quality of campus life for its students. Phase I of "Faith Village," a married student housing complex, was constructed in the summer of 1984 and provides living space for 18 couples and their families. The two buildings — Conley and Jones contain one and two bedroom apartments and a laundry facility.

"Faith Village" is a proposed threephase plan to better serve our growing population of married students at SPBC. The Board of Trustees approved plans for phase II during the 1984-85 academic year and construction was completed in the summer of 1985. Phase II included two additional buildings identical to those built the preceding summer. In addition, a "Faith Village" entrance was constructed, overhead power lines were buried and a playground area was built for small children.








New talent adds depth leads to another winning season

There's an old saying that lightning never strikes in the same place twice. The Crusader soccer team has proven that, as all rules go, this has exceptions. For the fourth year in a row, SPBC captured the conference title of the NICC. The Crusaders ended their season at 8-5-1, with a conference record of 5-1. Offensively the Crusaders were led by **Ron Rexilius** and **Joel Steinkamp**, while fullback **Dean Ericksonand goalie Paul Geer** anchored a solid defense. The Crusaders were unable to defend their national title won in 1983 when the tournament was cancelled.

In February, Coach Janis Runka and seven other soccer players travelled to Trinity Christian College for an annual Indoor Soccer Tournament. SPBC finished fourth in their division.

Their coach, Candace Moats, who played a year ago with them, had a good first year, despite the loss of key players from the previous season.


The team was a determined one, and despite difficulties such as being excluded from many tournaments for the lack of numbers on the front of their jerseys, they always pulled through. One example of this was a game at SPBC where they trailed Pillsbury by two games. Things looked bleak, but then, at President Dr. Eagen's prompting, the crowd began to pour in and cheer them on. The result was that the ladies recovered the ground they had lost and beat their rivals three games to two. As Coach Candace Moats put it, "They didn't give up. Even when the odds were against them, they were determined to keep going."

The team made an end-of-the-season push and captured second in the NICC tournament, by winning two of three games. The final season record of 6-8, excluding tournament play, was dismal, but did not reflect the attitude of the players. **Dawn Mattox** was awarded the MVP trophy for the team at the Sports' Banquet.

For the first time, St. Paul Bible College fielded a football team in 1984. The Crusaders were coached by Profes-sors Fred Polding and Don Alexander. The season opened with 27-0 and 28-0 College and Inver Hills Community College respectively, but the Crusaders were impressive for a rookie team. SPBC scored its first points and first

victory in an exciting 8-6 win over Pills-bury Baptist Bible College. Tim Maki entered the record books with the initial Crusader touchdown. The 1984-85 All-Alliance tournament was held here at St. Paul, and the gymnasium received a long overdue face-lift for the occasion. Despite the added cosmetics and long hours of practice, the young team went winless during the tournament, losing to tough Toccoa Falls and Simpson teams, and being totally out-classed by the defending All-Alliance champions from Nyack College.

The team finished the regular season at 10 wins, 13 losses, capturing third in the conference. In the post season play, they finished fourth in the NICC Tournament and due to Moody Bible's dropping out from the tournament, finished seventh out of eight at the NBCAA Tournament in Kansas City.

Although the team finished below .500 for the season, coach **Bud Pierce** stated, "When the season came to a close, here was strong team unity." Praise Performance was definitely the key to the high spirits at the season's close.










Baseball: Crusaders Travel South To Texas For Preseason Play

Women Crusaders Grow Despite A Winless Season

















Student Challenged at Deeper Life '84-'85

On Tuesday morning September fourth, 1984, the chapel pulpit sprang to life with warmth, sincerity, and excitement as the Rev. Paul Valentine opened the first series of Deeper Life meetings for the 1984-85 academic year.

Valentine preached a variety of messages throughout the week, dealing with the topics of marriage, family, and sexuality. The focus of Valentine's message centered on the roles of men and women in marriage and the need for communication and respect of each partner.

"A successful marriage is more than physical attraction. People marry a body. But you ought to marry a whole person. You want to have a person who is going to have a mental and a spiritual compatability with you," he said.






ties ranging from sightseeing and watching videos to sunbathing and even participating in an AWANA program at a local church (Alliance, of course).


Sentiments were mixed among students. For example, one student when asked his opinion regarding the required clean-up activity — replied, "Oh, was that today?"


"The biggest reason I like the job is that I like to tinker with things and I like to use my hands. Electronics really fascinate me," he says.

"The tracks have been laid for a good missions program," said Missions Department Chairman Fred Polding. SPBC has led all Alliance institutions in the number of people appointed to overseas service.

Despite a good record, Polding plans to continue to strive for excellence.

One goal is to focus on programs relating to current developments in missions. "For example there is a strong focus on unreached peoples. We are building in those kinds of subjects that will relate to identifying and reaching unreached peoples," Polding said.


Another goal is to offer more options to missions students. "A core curriculum would be offered with areas of minor concentrations to meet the interests of the students," Polding said.

For example, we might periodically offer a chance to go overseas to test the students' skills and to evaluate their future ministry in terms of a cross-cultural experience," he said.

"There are a lot of improvements that we can make and we want to be innovative ... purposefully."


