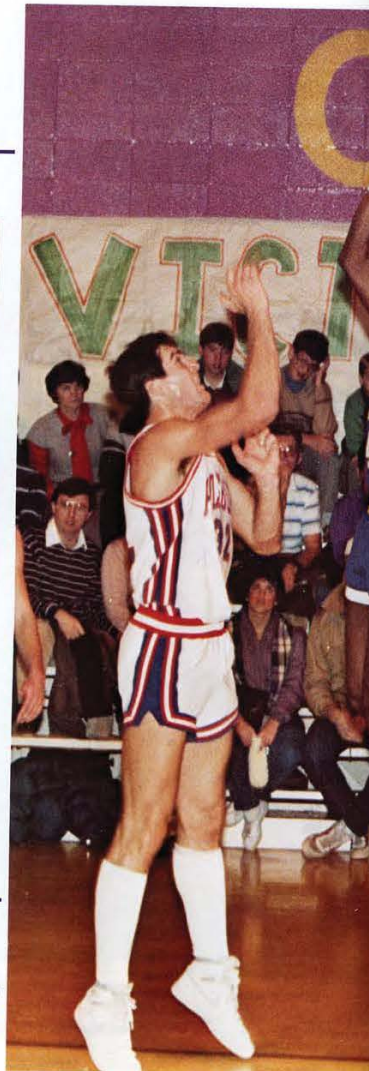

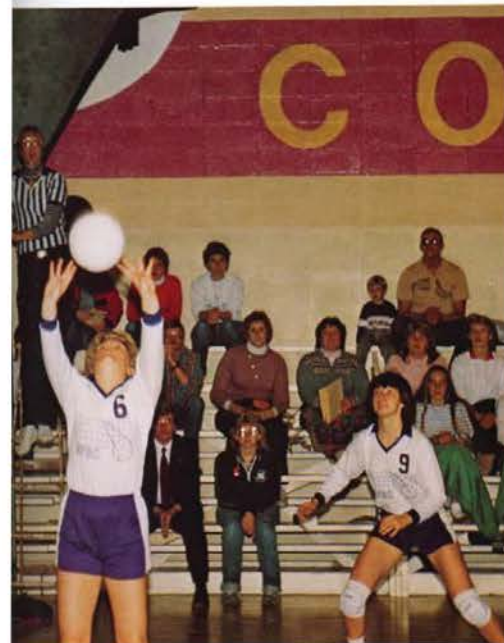

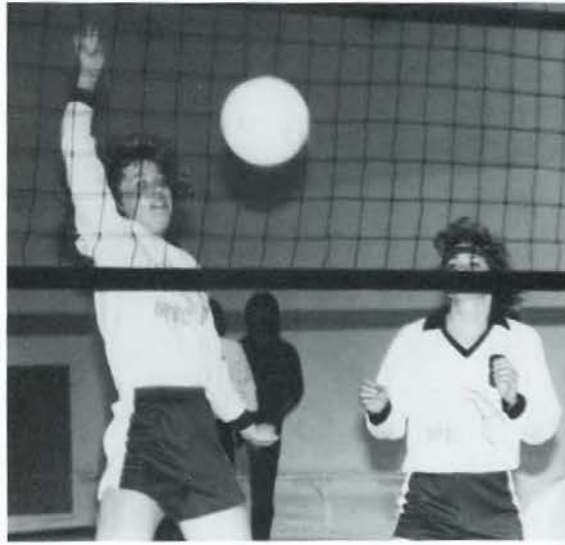

## Second Year Team Endures A Frustrating Year

In its second season, the team saw exhilarating victories, such as the 20-0 shutout of Trinity's Crusader team, and crushing defeats, such as the 71-7 loss to DMLC. In a season replete with inconsistency, one thing remained constant, and that one thing was the team's spirit. No matter what the situation, whether shutting out an opponent, or being shutout, whether playing against a team full of good sports, or a team made of bad ones, the spirit remained high, for the players performed not for themselves, but for Jesus Christ.

Overall, the Crusaders finished with a record of 3-5-0. Quarterback **John McIntire** rifled 163 passes in his last season, completing 62 of them for 1029 yards and 10 TD's. In the receiving department, **Brian Maki** led the team with 28 catches, netting 498 yards and 5 TD's. Halfback **Tim Maki** gained 489 yards and 98 runs to lead the backfield in rushing, while work-horse fullback **Mark Hummel** carried the ball 107 times for 465 yards and 2 TD's. Defensively, linebacker **Brian Heinen** brought down opposing players 105 times; cornerback **Ken Ludzak** intercepted 5 passes, and defensive lineman **Bob Havenor** bagged 6.5 sacks.

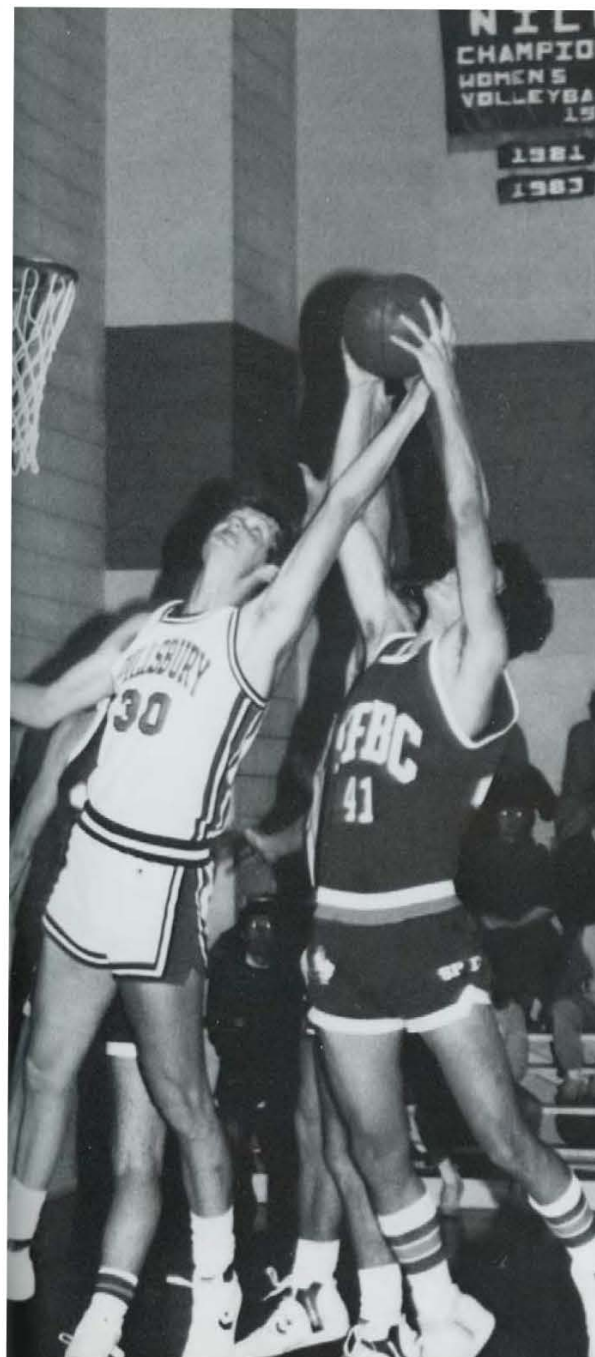

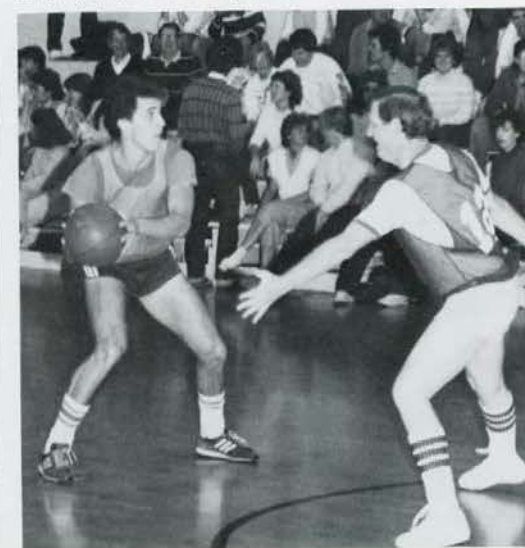

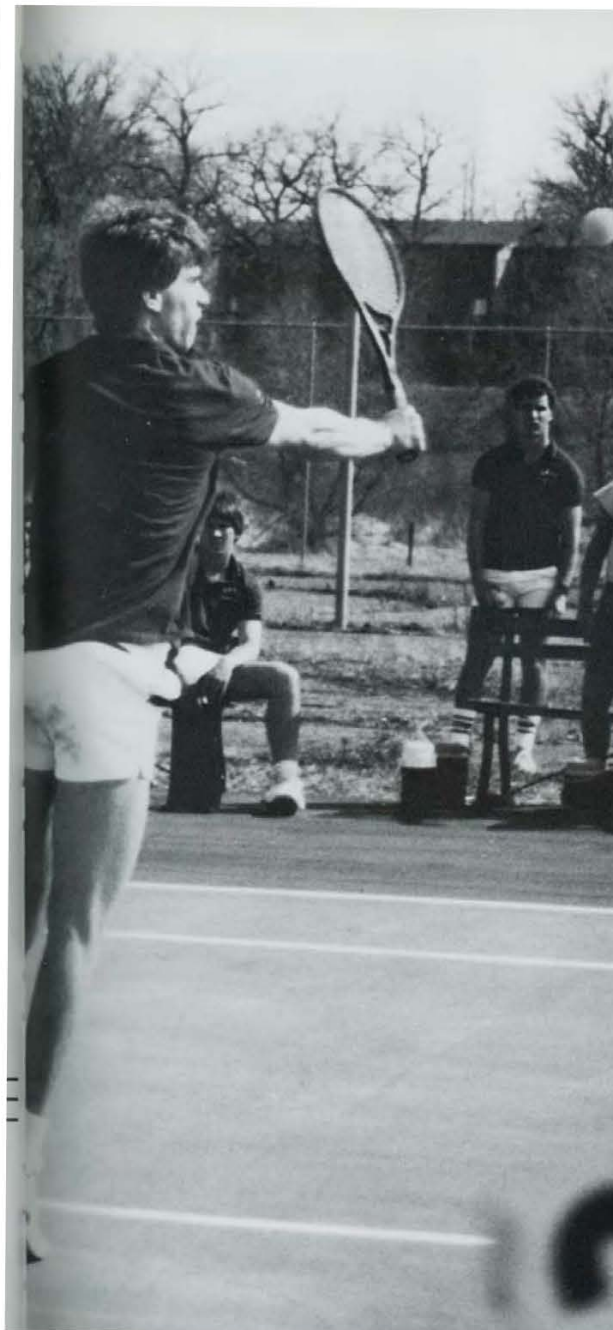

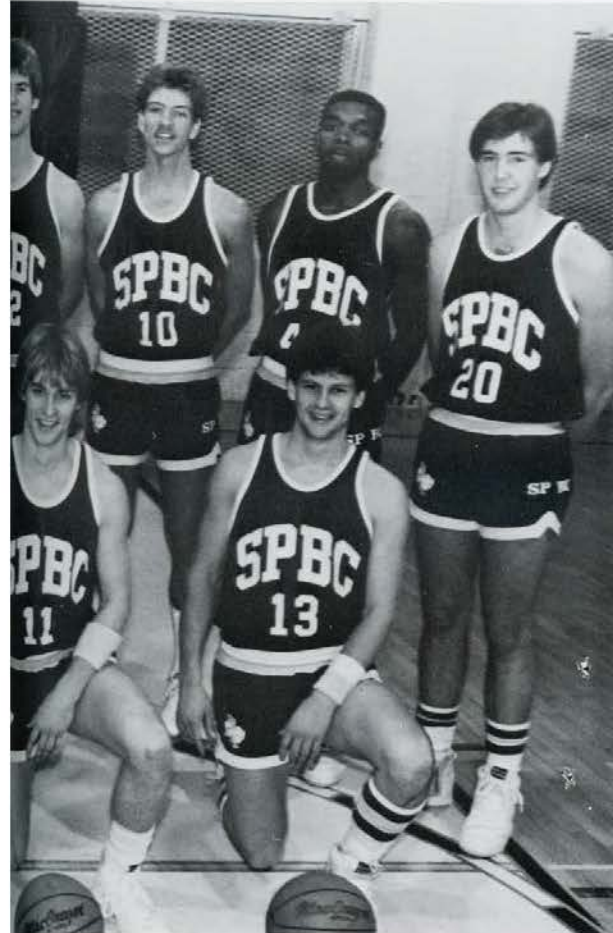

## Football

### Men's Basketball

The men's basketball team posted an 18-13 record and took second place in the NICC conference, second place in the All Alliance tournament, and fourth place in the National Athletic Association national tournament in Omaha, Nebraska.

Dean Jaderston was named to the NBCCA All American team and the NICC All Tournament team. Jaderston and Dave Maas were named to the All Alliance Tournament team. And Maas and Del Nollmeyer were named to the All Conference team.

The football team posted a 3-6 record in its second season, the first on the newly completed Crusader Field.

Defensive excellence was a key factor in the Crusaders' victories over Northwestern JV (18-0) and Trinity Bible College (23-14 and 20-0).

Outstanding players included captain and linebacker Brian Heinen, defensive backs Ken Ludzack and Pete Cannizarro, defensive linemen Mark White and Bob Havenor, quarterback John McIntire, fullback Mark Hummel, offensive lineman Albert Sepulveda, and special teams standout Brian Maki.

Coaches were Fred Polding, Gailen Stone, and Dennis Gilbertson.

## Tennis

The varsity tennis team had a winning season with 12 wins and 6 losses. The highlight of the year was placing second in the NICC tournament.

Outstanding singles players were Dean Jaderston and Del Nollmeyer, while outstanding doubles honors went to Julie Pierce and Dean Jaderston, and Bert Lebrun and Dan Gudopp. Gudopp, Jaderston, Lebrun, Nollmeyer, and Pierce won letters in the sport. Bud Pierce coached the team.

## Soccer

The 1985 soccer season was truly a growing one. After winning its first game of the season, the team lost six games straight. In true comeback form, the team then won its next seven games. Included in these were victories over Pillsbury Baptist Bible College and North Central College, teams that had previously beaten the Crusaders.

Ron Rexilius was the high scorer, and co-captains Mike Thompson and Dean Erickson used great speed and aggressiveness to add offensive threat.

The team ended the season with a disappointing loss to Winnipeg Bible College in a regional tournament in Rochester, Minnesota.

## Baseball

The highlight of the season was the two wins in the Metrodome against Dr. Martin Luther College as Mike Palkie pitched a no-hitter followed by Alan Vantilburg's one-hitter.

This team was one of the strongest SPBC has fielded in recent years, setting a 9-7 won-loss mark. Dan Conklin and Tom Driver were the captains with John Eagen and Don Hardy as coaches.

Other team members were Dave Banner, Allen Hart, Mark Hummel, Mike Lancy, Steve Leever, Ken Ludzack, Byron Logue, John McIntire, Tim Pofert, Jeff Pies, Albert Sepulveda, and Tony Vietti.

The pre-season featured the community all-stars in a challenge basketball game against the Minnesota Vikings. Proceeds went to purchase new baseball equipment.

## Cross-country

The 1985 cross-country team compiled an overall record of 7 wins and 5 losses, with a 4-0 conference mark. The highlight of the season came with the October 19 trip to Ellendale, North Dakota, where SPBC captured first place in the NICC conference and the national Bible college meet. Medalist Greg Gritz ran a course-record 27:09 for five miles, and Brad Clark placed second.

Five new runners joined the six returning team members: Lance Calkins, Brad Clark, Pat Endres, Marie Fitts, Jess Fleming, Gary Gilchrist, Greg Gritz, Elin Jamison, John Lund, Brian Miller, and Scott Stinson. Bill Bedford coached the team.

Marie Fitts was the most improved runner, completing the Twin Cities Marathon in 3 hours 12 minutes, good enough to qualify for the Boston Marathon.

## Volleyball

The women's volleyball team was "able to run a 5-1 offense this year with the setting ability of Donetta Miller," Coach Candace Moats said. "This gave us more depth by having three attackers in the front row."

The quick-set abilities of Stacy Keller and Beth Foster gave the team tremendous defense.

The team ended the season tied for first place with Trinity Bible College in the NICC conference and in fifth place in the first-ever NBCCA tournament. In the NBCCA tournament, Stacy Keller and Donetta Miller were named all-tournament players. Donetta Miller received all-American honors.

## Women's Softball

The highlight of the season was beating Northwestern in regular season play. Coach Candace Moats attributed the team's strength to the excellent pitching of Noelle Crocker and the "fight" demonstrated by the entire team.

Kellie Herman won the Most Valuable Player award while Vangie French took the Most Improved Player award.

Other team members were Monica Bakken, Terry Bentley, Jeanne Dustin, Lynne Frutiger, Rachel German, Vicky Hill, Stacy Keller, Linda Morrow, Dawn Mattox, Donetta Miller, Marie Wahlstrom, Sue Wallace, and Renee Young.

Kevin Carothers went home to be with the Lord on May 6, 1986, after a brief but courageous battle with cancer. A junior in the Christian education department, Kevin had been active in campus life.

He had served as sophomore class president, Campus Days Committee chairman (1985), New Student Days Committee member, concert choir member, band member, and South American Prayer Band president. In January Kevin had begun working as youth pastor at Nowthen Alliance Church in Anoka, where he did the things he enjoyed most, serving our Lord while ministering to young people.

Kevin's life was a good example of the

love of God. Those around him could see the joy Kevin had for the Lord in his bubbly, and sometimes crazy, actions. After his death his family received hundreds of letters from people who had been touched by Kevin's life.

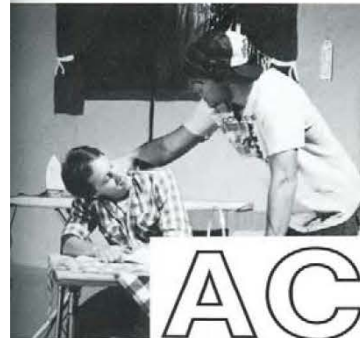

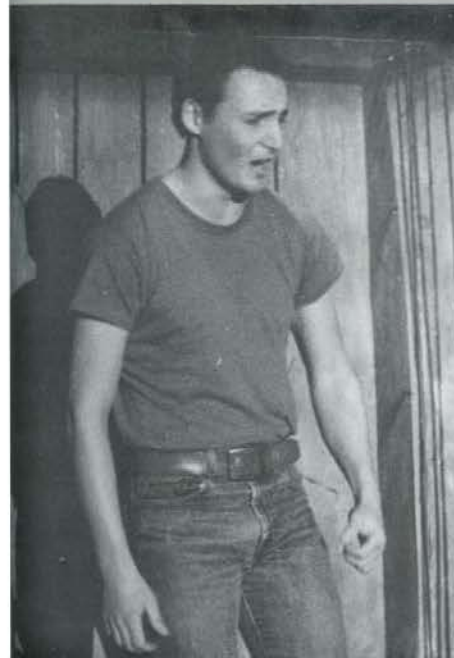
## Seniors Break Tradition — Cast Serious Drama

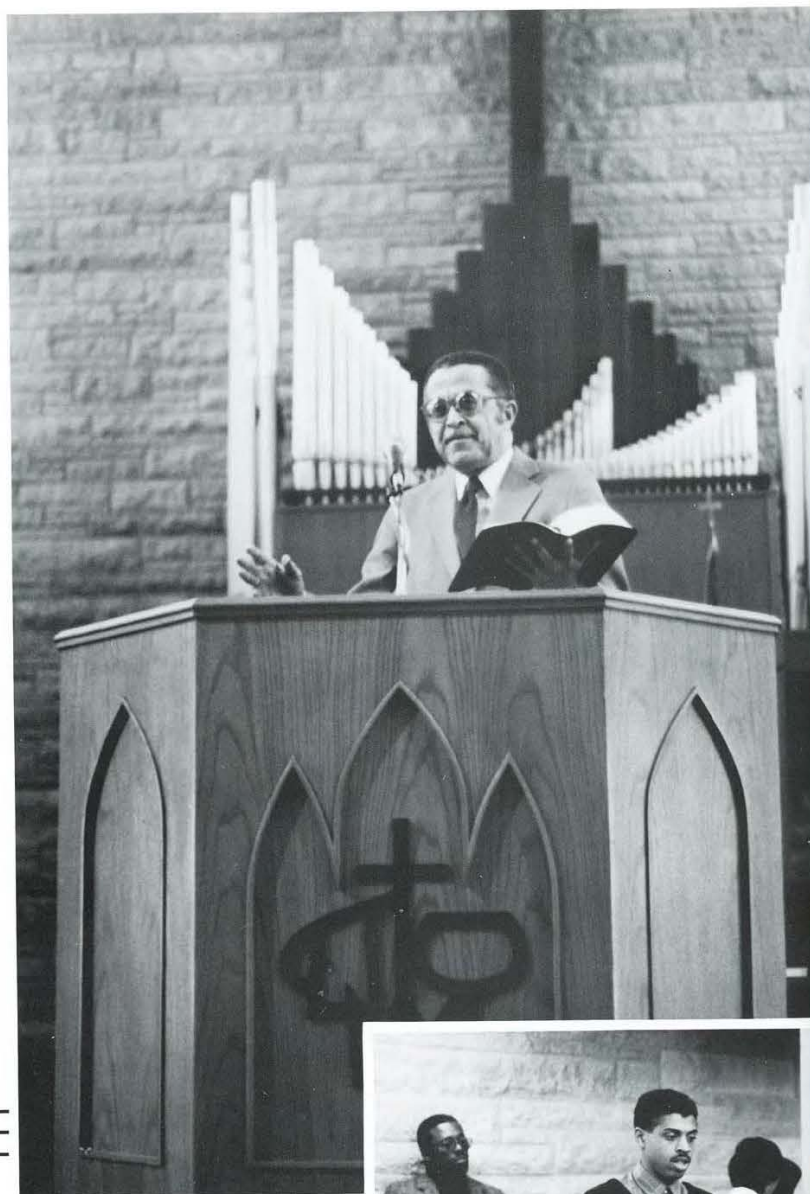

## From Glory to Glory

One of the benefits of being in a cross-cultural environment is the fascinating people you meet from across the globe. I have recently met two delightful young ladies from Australia, a mother and daughter, Dorothy and Beth Langstaff. To them the Christian life is viewed as a life obedient to the living God who guides His children with His providential hand. This can be seen first from their conversion experiences. Dorothy remembers always believing in Jesus, having been raised in a Christian home. She states that she had "a big brother who was such a beautiful example to me. I think that is why I absorbed so much of what God was like." At the age of 8, while in a field one day, Dorothy said, "I had such an awareness that God had called me to a special task." Soon after, Dorothy became aware of the divided churches and had a burden to see unity come to these churches. Beth also received Christ at an early age. She grew up in a pastor's home and heard Bible stories, but at the age of six, at a Billy Graham Crusade, she sensed the call of God and went forward. Beth says, "I was quite insistent that I go down front and pray. I can only describe what Jesus meant to me then in very simple terms; He was real and very vivid to me."

Dorothy and Alan were married in their early 20's in 1958. Beth was born three years later. Alan was in architectural school when God called him to the ministry. But after five years

at seminary, they found themselves emotionally, physically, and spiritually distraught. Instead of taking a desired year of rest, they faced their first ministry with a new outlook. "It was at this time that God gave us an Abraham-like call to leave all for the ministry. This was a crisis experience that caused us to walk in the trials being totally dependent on God."

God then called them out of the Methodist Church to work with many other churches, founding a renewal ministry called "The Temple Trust." In the early 70's they toured America, visiting Melodyland Christian Center where they experienced worship in a different way. Dorothy reflects: "I would like to say that we owe a lot to America for its spiritual inspiration. There are many times when we travel back to Australia that we feel spiritually starved because we don't have the Christian input, in radio for example, Chuck Swindoll and James Dobson. I don't think Americans quite realize how God has abundantly blessed them with a feast of spiritual food."

By 1979, the Lord had blessed the Langstaffs with a T.V. ministry, a Bible school, and a children's ministry. In this same year they moved into a new house and Dorothy had a strange experience. One night, Dorothy recalls, "I became overwhelmed with grief. I went into the bedroom and picked up a book by the bed. I read these words, 'We did it, we left our ministry, our



home, our families, and our country and went to the other side of the world. I knew then God was going to move us." In January and February of 1980, Alan went to America and spoke at a Pastors Conference at North Heights Lutheran Church. He was speaking on delegating authority. He felt like God was saying "Delegate your ministry and move to America." After the meeting a couple came up to him with a word from the Lord that he was to delegate his ministry in Australia.

The Langstaffs arrived in Minnesota in 1980, with a few resources. They started Kairos ministries, continuing their emphasis on spiritual renewal. Alan is a pastoral consultant at Cathedral of Praise in Eden Prairie. As for Dorothy and Beth, they are students here at SPBC, taking a course in Romans together.

Going to SPBC was no chance happening either. The Lord directed them to a house near Hwy. 7 in St. Boni. Of this Dorothy states, "It is an awesome thing to be in the right place at the right time." To both Dorothy and Beth, SPBC has been an exhilarating experience. Beth is a history major and came to St. Paul as a transfer student from Bethel. She became ill to the point of hospitalization from asthma and had to leave school, to later resume her studies at St. Paul. She desires to go on to seminary, at Fuller. "I feel called to biblical studies. I would like

to study the languages and do some writing." It was Beth who talked her mother into taking the Romans class. How do they like it? Beth says, "I think we have become closer in more of a friendship way." Dorothy agrees and says that they should "provoke one another to good works." After Dorothy's first lesson under Dr. Alexander, she smiled to herself and asked, "Lord what am I doing here?" The answer came "Even if I receive no other benefit, to do the class with Beth is a special blessing for both of us." I asked if there was anything they would share with the students, and Beth replied, "After working in a Christian school and seeing how hard it is to keep a spiritual atmosphere, I really appreciate SPBC. There is a freedom to seek God." Dorothy puts it this way, "God is alive, faithful, and challenging us to a deeper prayer life. The young people have so much potential. I believe that they can be a part of something special that God wants to do in America that could affect the whole world." Paul put it this way, "But we all, with open face beholding as in a glass the glory of the Lord, are changed into the same image from glory to glory, even as by the Spirit of the Lord" (II Cor. 3:18). The Langstaffs reflect this glory; may we follow their humble example.

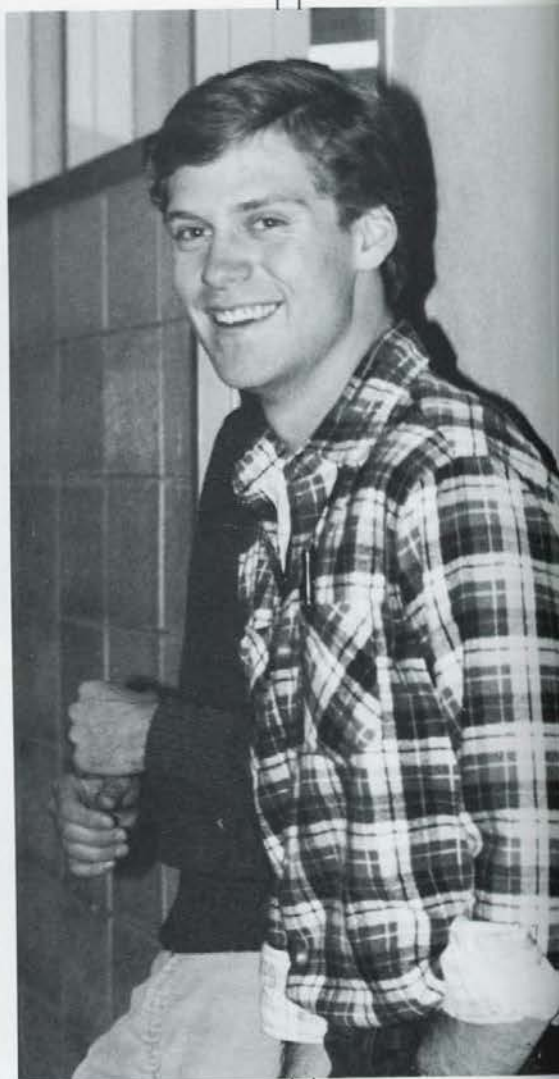

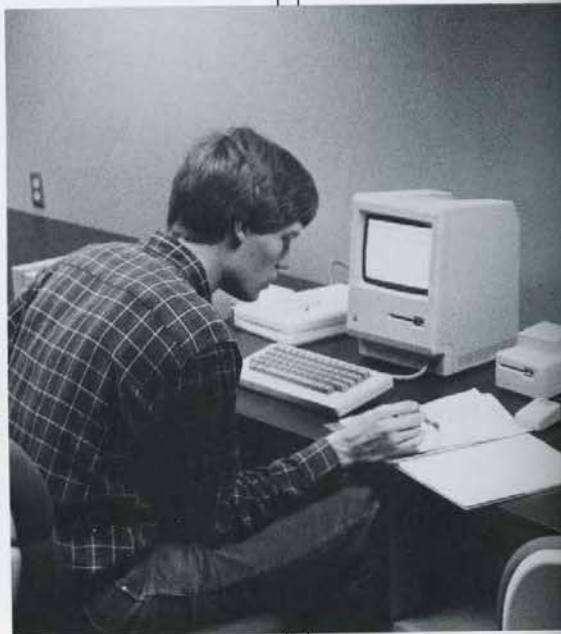

I began to recognize the need for a stronger biblical foundation.

"I always had the desire to get my degree. SPBC was my choice because of

the quality of the instructors and the spiritual background that is emphasized. Confirmation that the Lord wanted me at SPBC was through a lady in my home church. She had been praying that I would get back into some type of ministry. I was shocked because I had no idea that she had been praying," Mulligan said.

"There is no doubt in my mind that this is where God wants me. It was hard to come here, but it has been good. God has been so faithful, supplying me a job at Pizza Hut, and the neat roommates that I have are a confirmation that God wants me here.

"My message to the students of SPBC that are fighting being here is for them to look at the opportunities here and take advantage of them. If you fight it, you are going to have a negative attitude and you are going to miss out on one of the neatest experiences of your life."

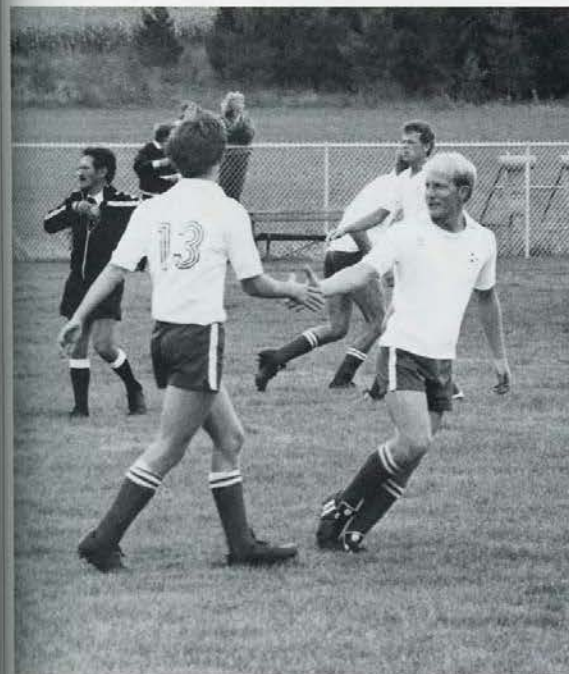

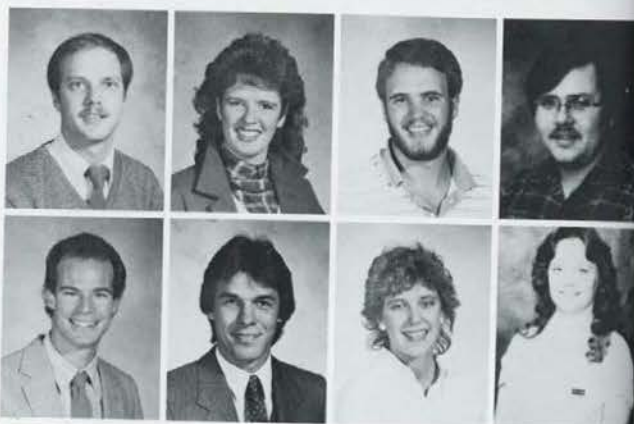

According to Marie, "I don't make running my life. But, because it is a part of my life, I give it my best."

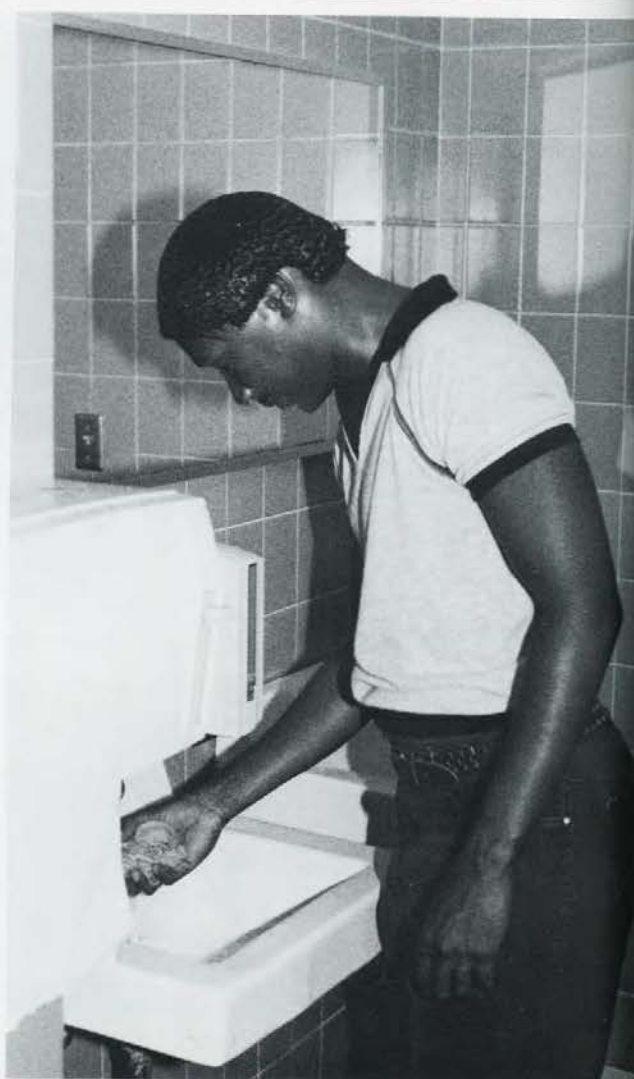
Preparation for the 26.2-mile race included Marie's competing in the Twin

He did not know what it meant to be a Christian but did not want anyone to know he was at the time. In time he did get involved with Bible reading and study but kept mostly to himself.

Since his father had studied in the States in the 1960's, he had the opportunity to come back to live. An interview was conducted and he was accepted. Soon the Sayavong family was off to the United States.

After they received a sponsor and got settled, Bounnhong found a Lao Christian church. As he began to grow he found out that he was not serving God fully, but he determined to do so. He felt like among the Lao people the "harvest is ready but the workers are all too few."

Now after attending SPBC for two years Sayavong is open to God's leading. "The Lao people are lost and need people to go and tell them." Sayavong has a better time with English now and expresses his feeling toward the professors here at SPBC. "They understand our problem with English and spend time helping us."

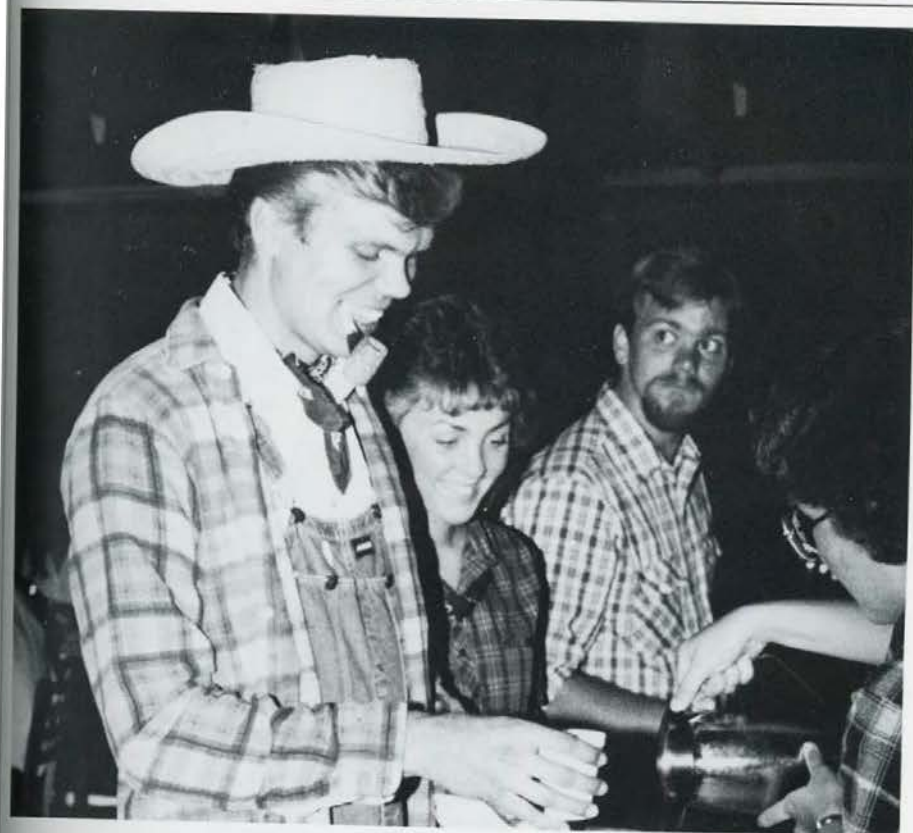

"I don't want to brag, but I believe God has used my handicap in a special way in the rest home ministry," Linda Southall commented on her involvement in the nursing home ministry last year. "They admired my courage and stamina. They could be encouraged by it."

Southall's courage and spirit are a lesson to us all. The 21-year-old Montana resident spends a lot of time in the library in order to keep up her GPA of 3.5. She plans to major in history and secondary education. Her long-range goal is to achieve a Ph.D. in history or philosophy. Southall enjoys spending time with her friends, laughing, and having fun. She also enjoys reading in her spare time.

Southall was born with cerebral palsy. The history major explains, "The brain does not send whole messages to the muscles, thus impairing the ability to

When asked about SPBC's architectural barriers for those in wheelchairs, Southall says, "The way the elevator door is set up, I need help. It is a pain!!! If it were the sliding type, I could be more independent."

When asked what advice she has for us about those with disabilities, she replies, "Don't be overly helpful. You don't have to blow their noses, but then again don't throw their crutches down the hall."

The junior has a healthy perspective about her condition. "God has a special purpose for me, but I probably won't know it fully until I meet him."

## Business Major Offered in Fall 1986

Two new business majors will be available to students next fall. They are a four-year business education and a four-year business administration program.

Dr. Weldin and Kim Noble together began work to design the programs only last year. As of October, the proposals were approved by the faculty and passed by the Board of Trustees.

The existing business programs offer only a two-year secretarial science associate degree, an executive secretarial program, or a secretarial science minor. The new majors will make it possible for a student in the existing two-year program to receive an associate degree and then attend SPBC an additional two years to receive a bachelor of science degree in business, since the new programs are built upon the present ones.

No new equipment will be needed for the programs. A new professor will be hired, however, to teach Accounting II and some computer courses for the business administration program.

The business administration major is designed to train men and women to be business administrators in the church or in church-related organizations. The business education major will have adequate training to teach

school at the junior and senior high level. The student is able to choose one of three specialty areas in which he or she will fulfill 12 required hours of study. These specialty areas include accounting and data processing, secretarial specialty, and clerical specialty. If none of the three areas appeal to the student, the comprehensive (two-year associate of science) program may be substituted. Finally, 18 hours in secondary/professional education are required to complete the major.

To reduce problems with the state, these programs have been set up according to state guidelines. The state dictates how many hours are required in each area for a degree to be "valid." Some changes also were made in existing course titles so that the state could more easily identify courses offered at SPBC that are equivalent to those on its own list. "Business uses for computers" will be changed to "Business data processing," and "Office administration" will be changed to "Office management." Another modification will be the reduction of hours required in the typing III class from three to two. This will make the class the same for both the business administration and business education programs.

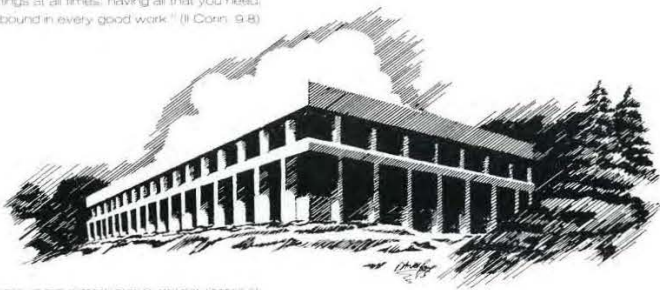

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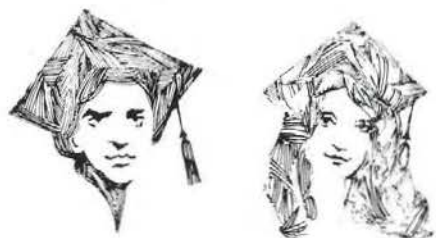
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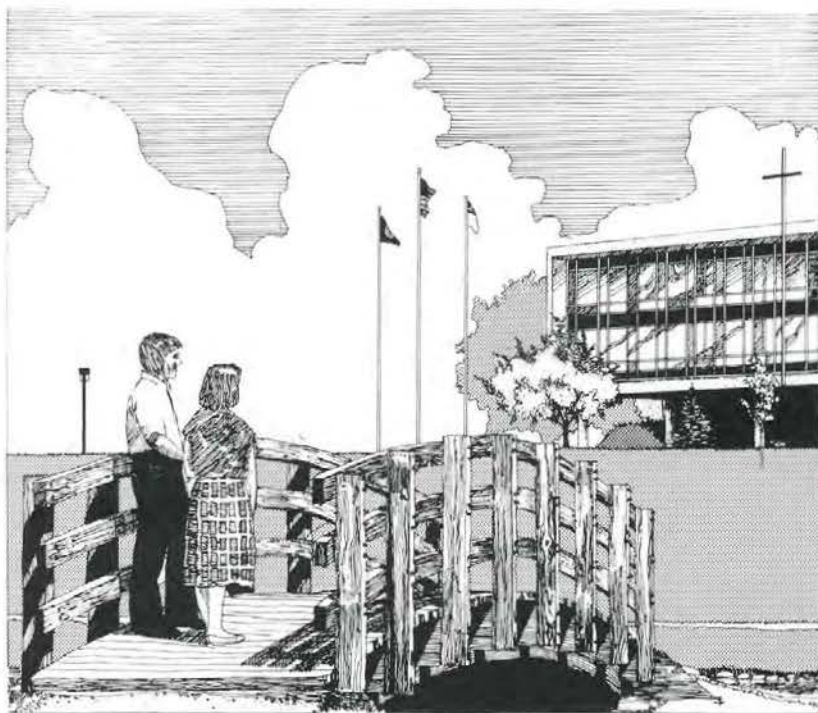
