





Crown professors made the classes


Crown professors made the classes more interesting and valuable. The professors were experts in their field and well educated. Many students chose their class schedule on the sole basis of who was teaching the class.





Some other business that the Senate proposed was a change in the minimum age for single students to be allowed to live off-campus. The proposal called for the minimum age to be dropped to 25 years old from 26. A letter to the Student Affairs committee was drafted
