Members of the Student Senate had fun while discussing important issues During the course of the year, the Senate was instrumental in beginning a Safe Rides program to cut down on drunk driving, discussing a new student union, and getting off-campus students more involved in campus life

Some other business that the Senate proposed was a change in the minimum age for single students to be allowed to live off-campus. The proposal called for the minimum age to be dropped to 25 years old from 26. A letter to the Student Affairs committee was drafted
which stated the Senate's desire to lower the minimum age.

The Senate was also involved with regulating student organizations. Each organization had a representative as a member of the Senate. The organization representatives were required to report budgets and activities of their respective rganizations to the Senate and the organizations were under the authority of the Senate.

Political awareness of Crown students was a concern for the Senate, as well. A temporary ad hoc committee was formed to keep students appraised of candidates' views on important subjects
during the 1992 presidential electio Senate Vice-President Victor Garder headed the committee and w responsible for getting information each of the candidates to students.
