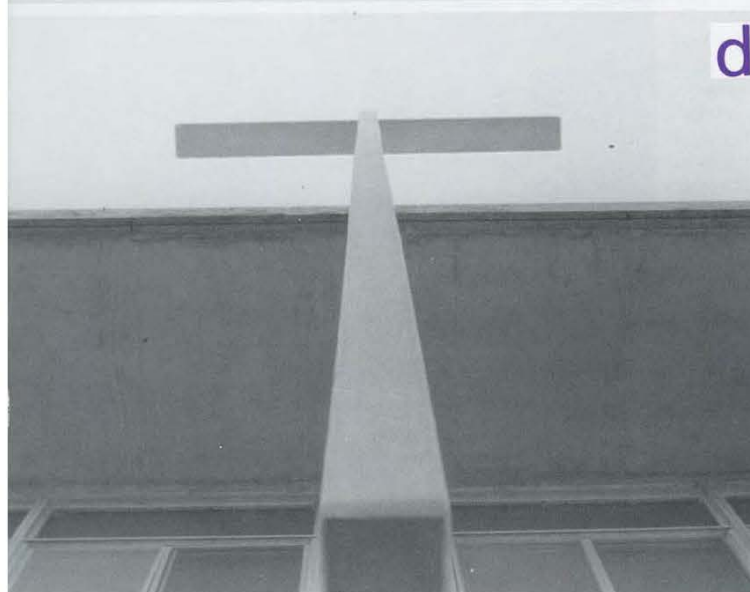
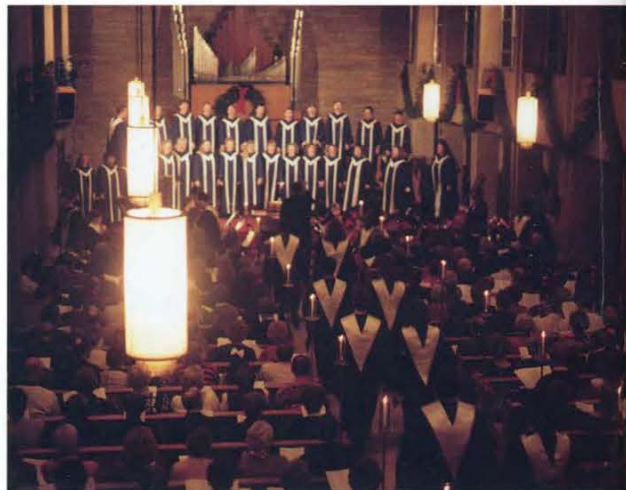

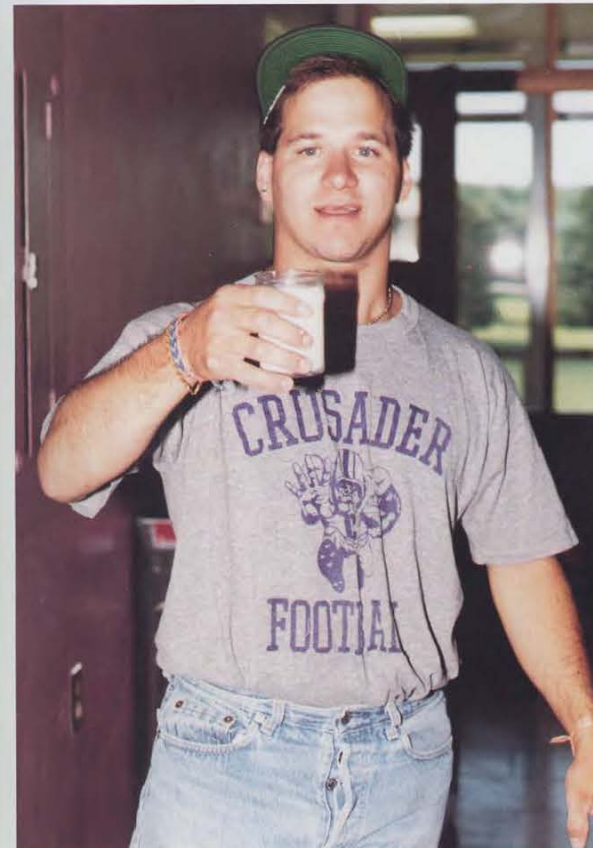

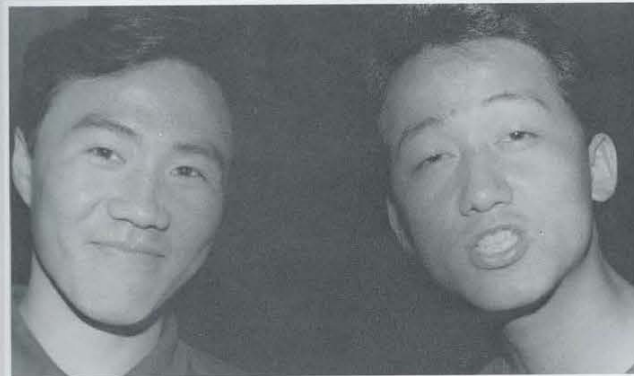

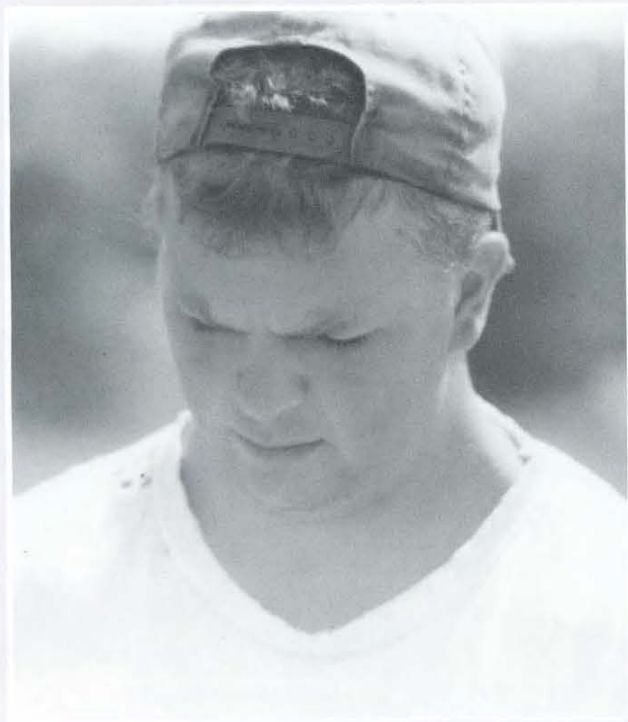

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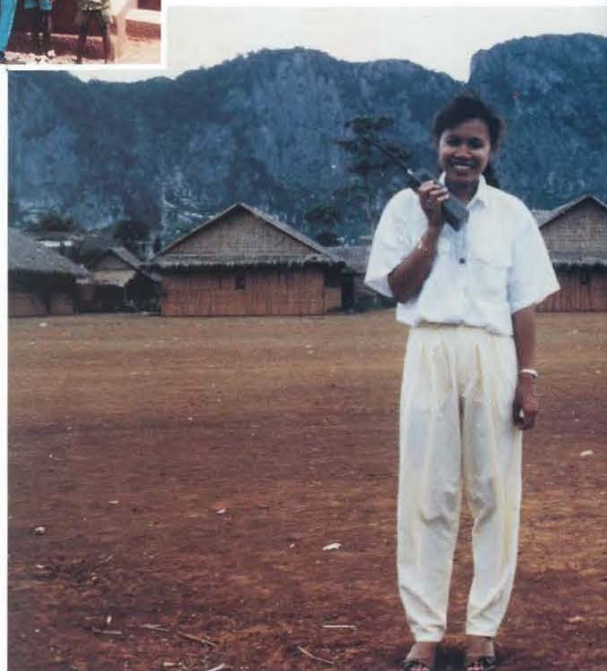

During the summer of 1992, eight members of the Crown College family enjoyed a ministry with the Alliance Youth Corps. They served in six different countries in capacities as varied as literature distribution, personal evangelism, vacation Bible school, and camp ministries.

Each student had to go through an

application process, raise support, attend preparation meetings, and obtain a passport, visa, and shots.

Each person who went overseas had a different reason for gaining ministry experience instead of spending the summer in more usual ways.

Their experiences were also different. Bryan Johnson, for instance, ate some smoked rat in a village in Ivory Coast while visiting several villages. He also played the piano for missions meetings and helped lead a vacation Bible school for missionary children.

Johnson said, "I would definitely recommend AYC to anyone. Don't think that it is just for missions majors. It will help anyone to pray for missionaries, and it will broaden anyone's perspectives."

Bill Aurich was a part of a team in the Philippines. His team visited churches, giving their testimonies, preaching, and singing. They also participated in friendship evangelism by playing basketball and leading Bible studies in three factories.

Aurich testified to the Lord's faithfulness:

"God met all my needs last summer. He kept me safe and took care of my finances. I learned that no matter what I do in the future, taking the Gospel to others is going to be part of my life."

Another student who went out with an AYC team was Madachen Pel. At the age of fourteen, she and her family had left a Cambodian refugee camp in Thailand to come to the United States. Pel returned to Thailand to work with Cambodian refugees.

Pel-labelled bags of drugs in a pharmacy, visited people in a hospital, and taught the Bible to women. She was able to locate a cousin and lead him and his wife to faith in Christ.

"I wanted to know what missionary life is like," said Pel. "My future plans are to return to Cambodia as a missionary, going house to house telling people about Jesus and encouraging Christians."

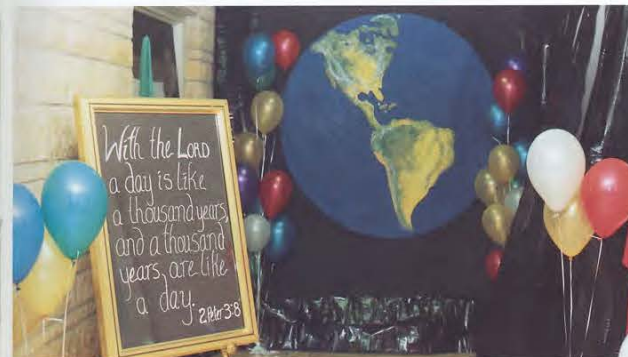

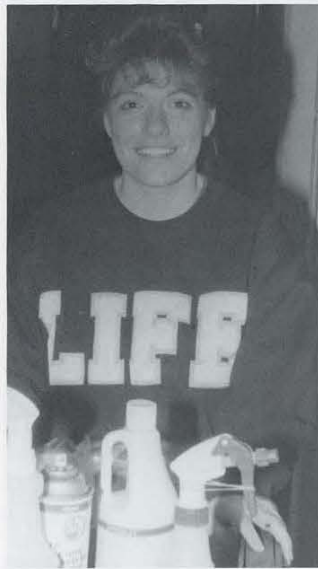

Monique Vangsoulatda summed up her CWS experience: "I had a fun time being able to interact with my fellow students during CWS."

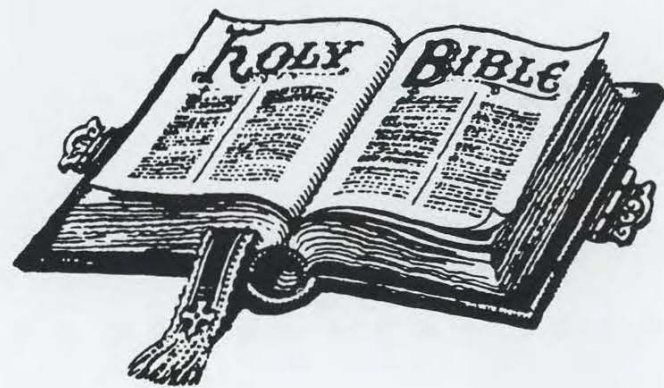

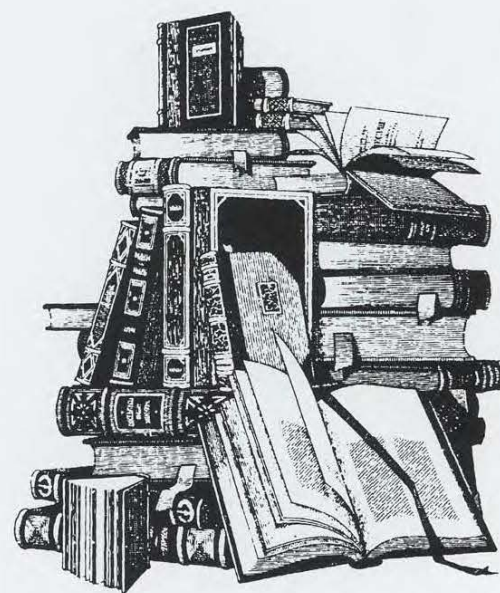

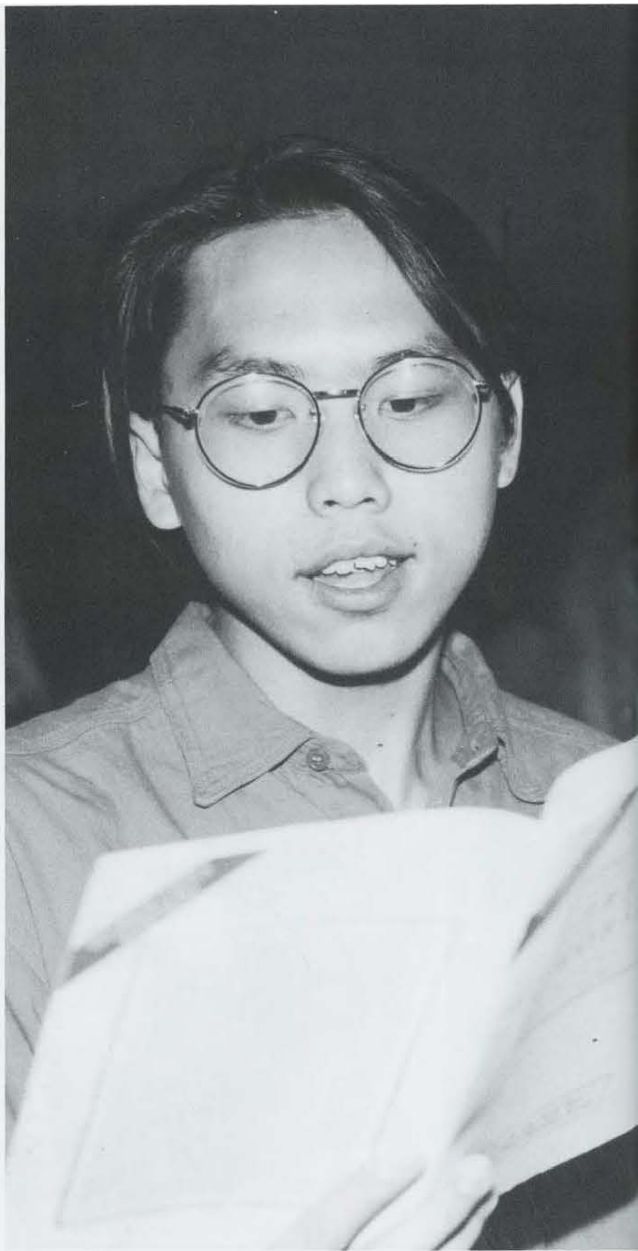

Members of the Student Senate had fun while discussing important issues. During the course of the year, the Senate was instrumental in beginning a Safe Rides program to cut down on drunk driving, discussing a new student union, and getting off-campus students more involved in campus life.

Some other business that the Senate proposed was a change in the minimum age for single students to be allowed to live off-campus. The proposal called for the minimum age to be dropped to 25 years old from 26. A letter to the Student Affairs committee was drafted

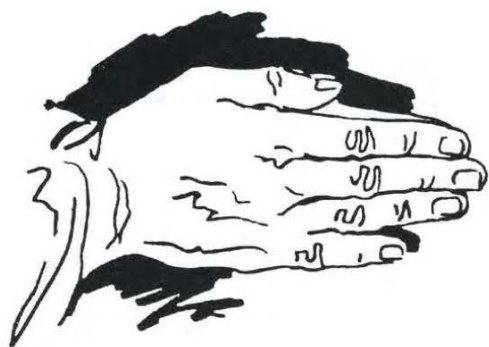

for the team. They led the team to be spiritually focused on Christ, and they encouraged team unity.

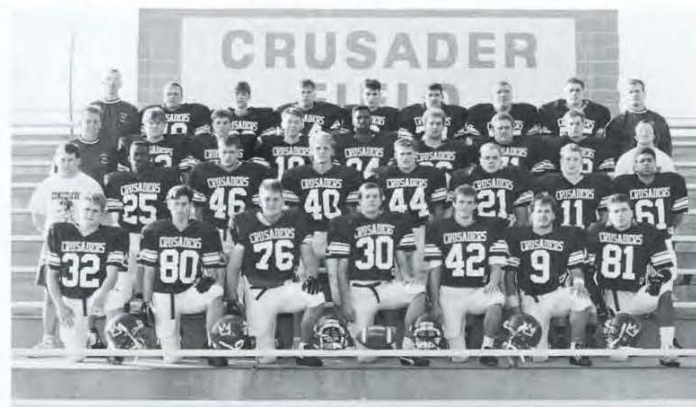
The lack of players was a source of frustration. With barely enough players for both offense and defense, each player had to demonstrate dedication and hard work. Under this pressure the team persevered and improved.

overcome. The team played skillfully without the help of any seniors, and they defeated teams from much larger colleges.

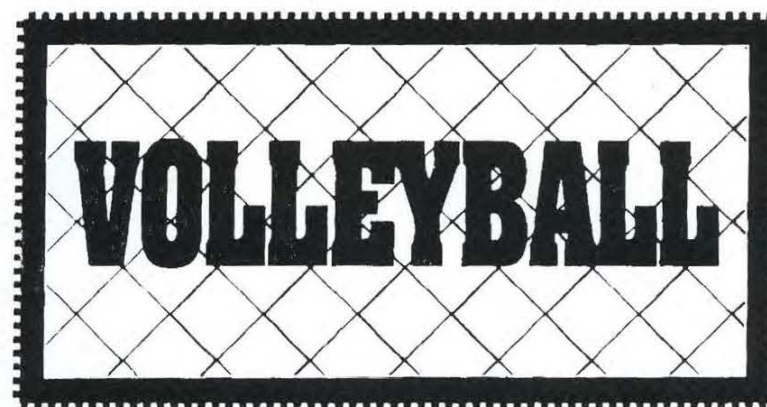

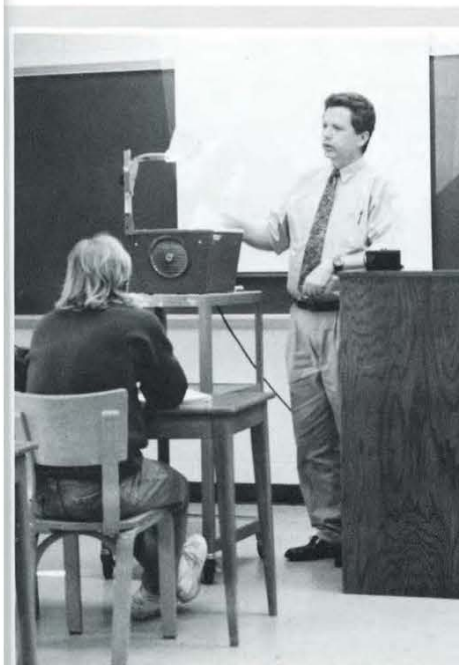
