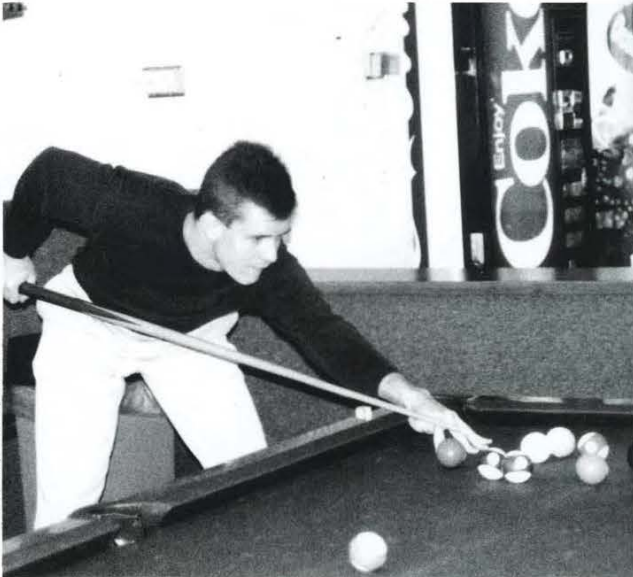

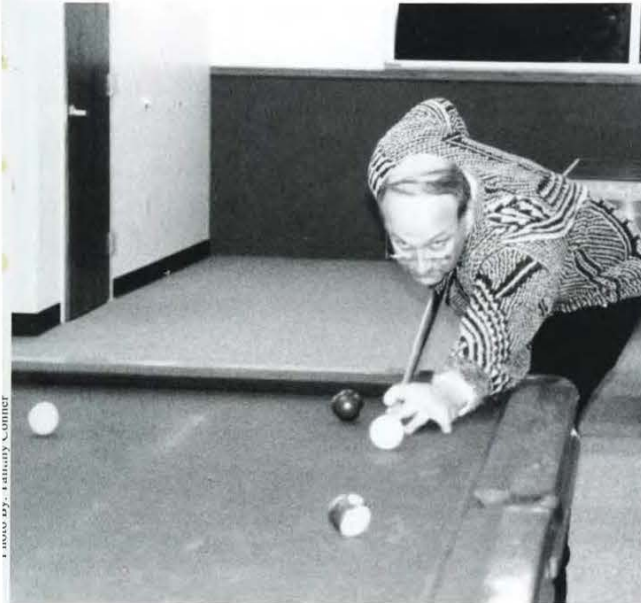

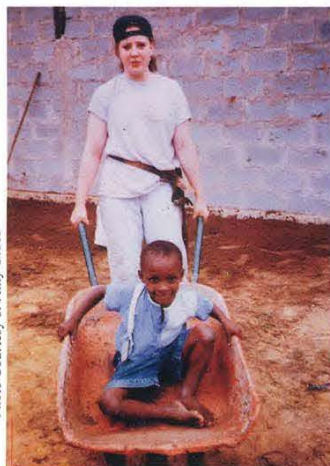

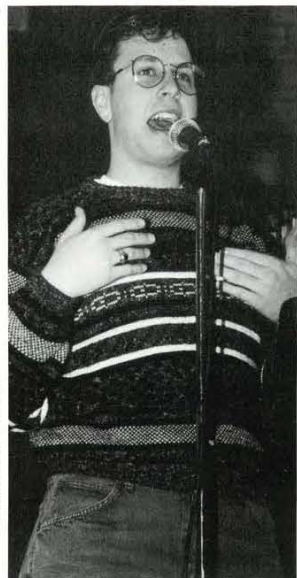

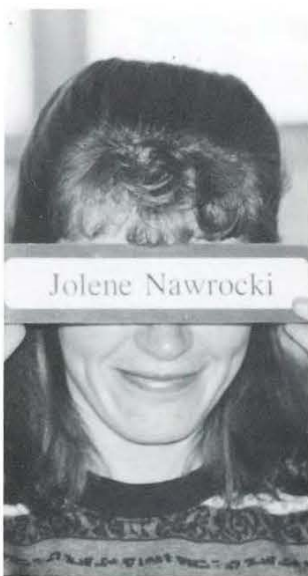

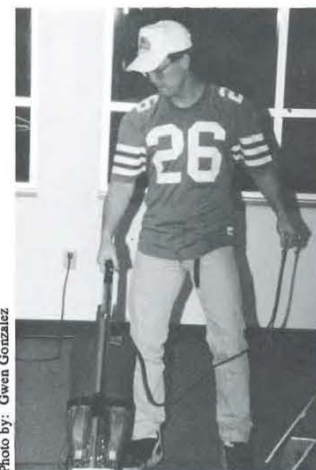

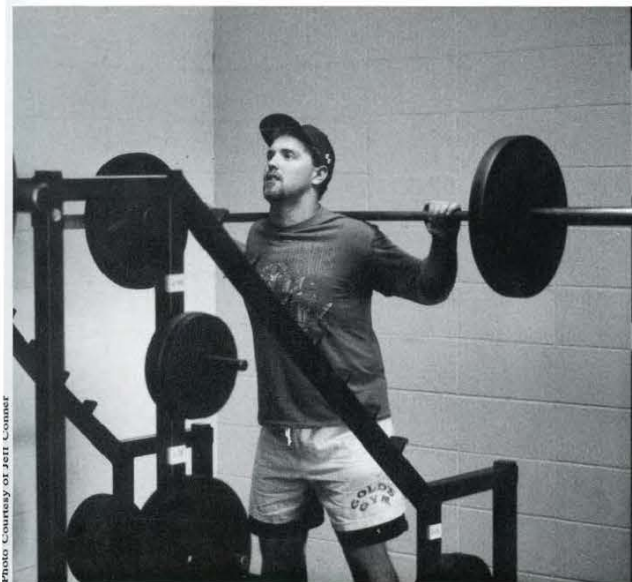

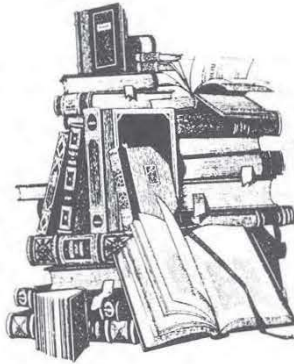


# TIME IS TICKING AWAY!

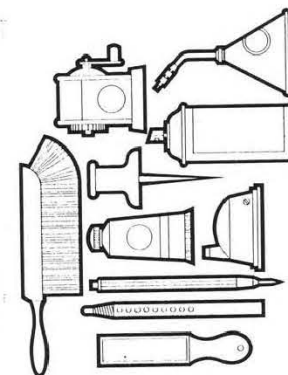

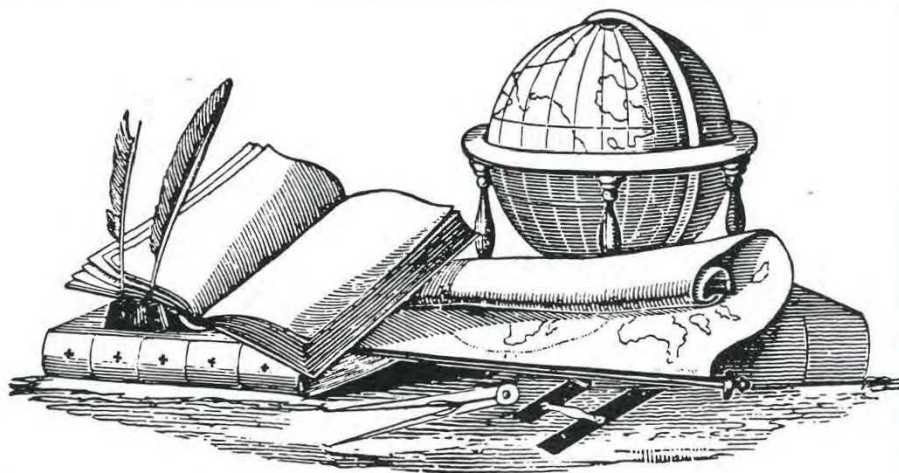

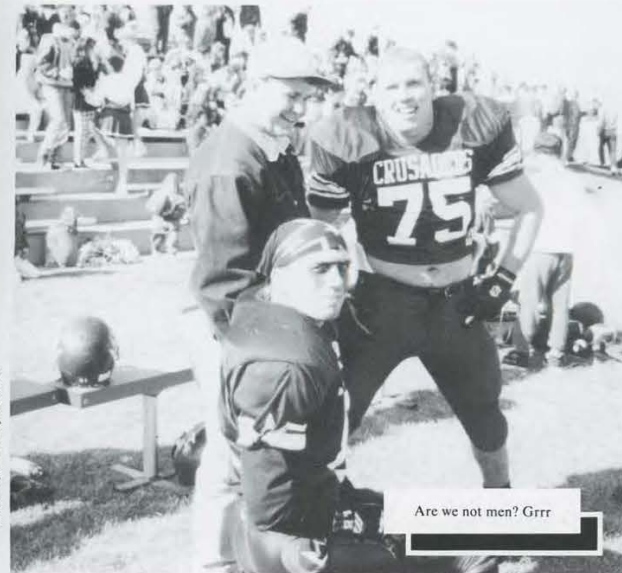

On a warm spring day, a group of energetic men would go out to a field for sometimes an entire afternoon playing for God and their school. These men are better known as the Crown College Baseball team.

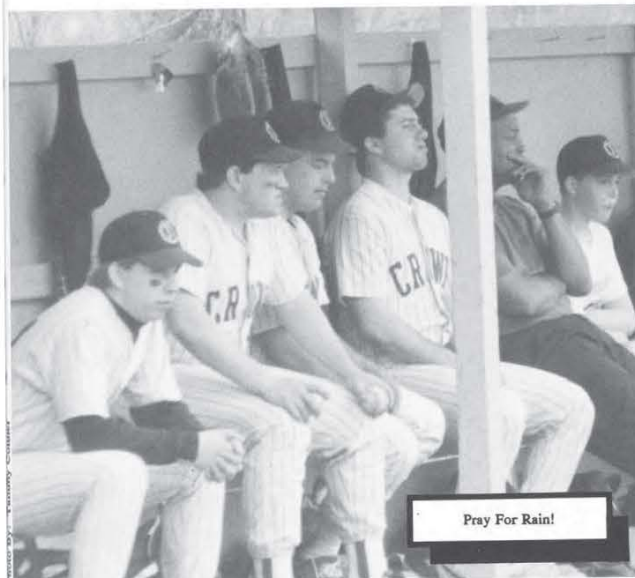
The team did well considering the youth of some of the member and the coach's experience. The team had many rough spots which they seemed to be overcoming towards the end of the season.
