## Mission Support Teams

The main theme of Crown College this year was a Window To The World. One way Crown demonstrates this is through Mission Support Teams or MSTs. MSTs focus on prayer, the basis for everything. At Crown we all endeavor to uplift the college, missions, and the people of the world to the Lord.
MSTs are groups that were formed as prayer bands for all major parts of the World. Once a week, each Monday morning, groups get together, discuss events and pray for the missionaries in their part of the world. There are six active groups at Crown: the Middle East, Africa, Latin America, South America, Europe/ West Asia, and Eastern Asia/Pacific Islands. Students have their choice of being in one of these prayer bands.
The sole purpose of these groups is to uplift a certain missionary family to the Lord through prayer and missionary family to the Lord through prayer and
support. Some different ways that MSTs encourage the missionaries are by sending care packages, keeping in contact through mail, and praying. The definite advantage of being in a MST is being able to get to know the missionaries on a personal level. Oftentimes we view missionaries as "superhuman" witnesses to Christ. In actuality, they are just common people called by God to do His work. They struggle with the same issues as those of us in the United States and they feel the same as we do. Being overseas is difficult and full of pressure, but with the help of caring people we can ease their burden through prayer and encouragement.
