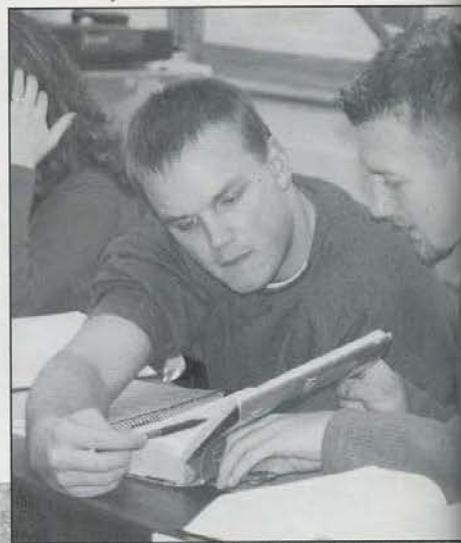

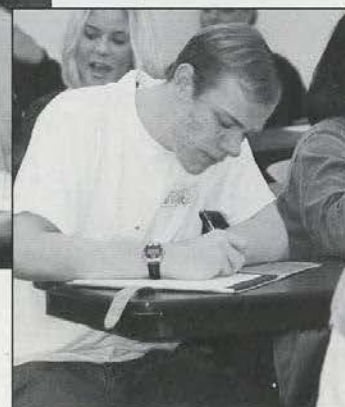

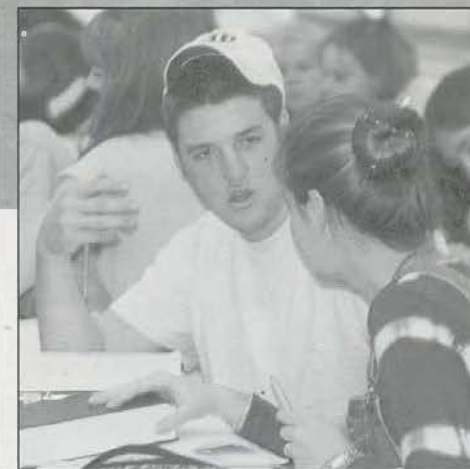

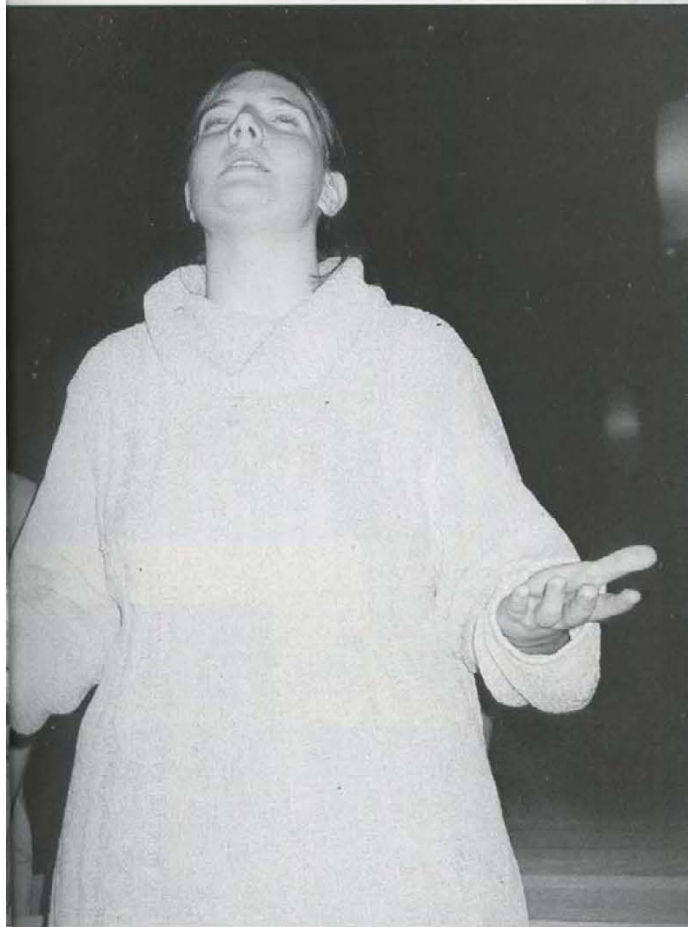

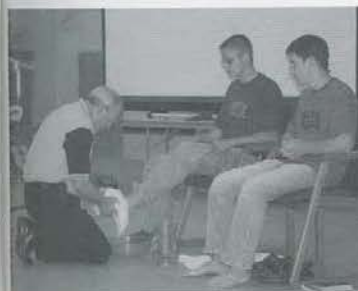

Eduventure: Overseas and in the States

My semester on EduVenture, which took place in Sumba, Indonesia and Datil, New Mexico, is a time that I know I will draw from for many years to come. It was a time of brokenness before the Lord, where we had to either trust God or just cry out of desperation; sometimes both. I felt like such an infant when we first arrived there, not knowing the language or the culture, and being dependant on others for virtually everything. It was such a profound blessing though to realize that the God I served and loved was the same One that my Sumbanese friends worshipped as well. It challenged me to not put limits on God and to make my heart soft and teachable before Him, so that He could pour out His love through me. It was profoundly confusing to relocate to Datil, New Mexico after the September 11th attacks, and the heightened state of tension in the world. It was frustrating to have to leave all that God was doing in Sumba, but we learned to adjust and find joy in God anyway, despite our circumstances, which is a lesson we might have otherwise missed.

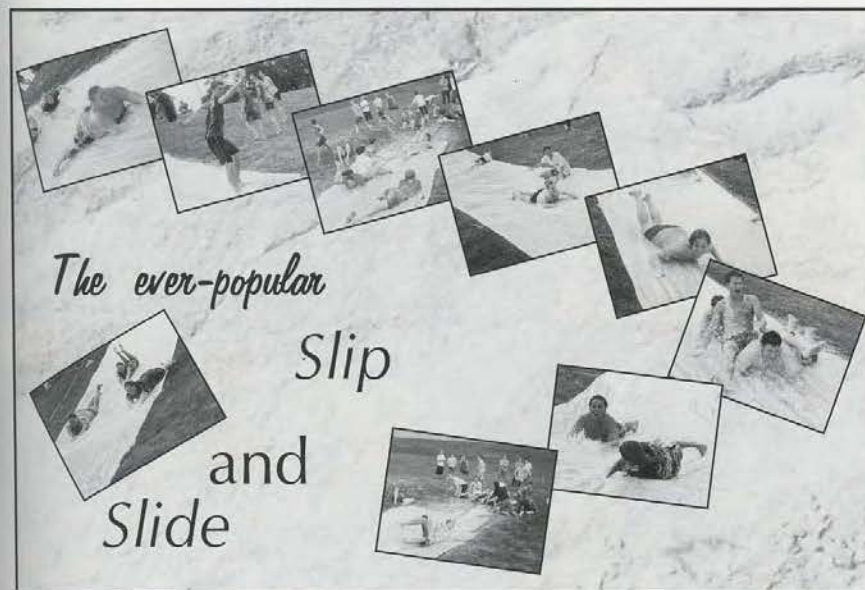

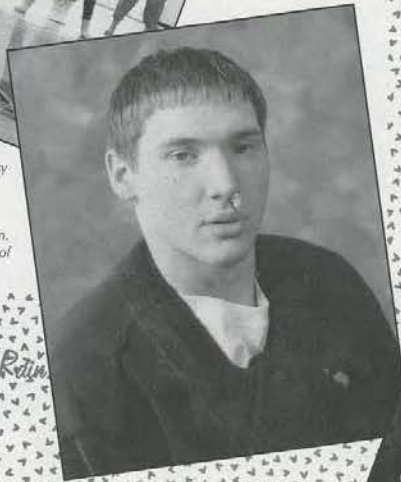

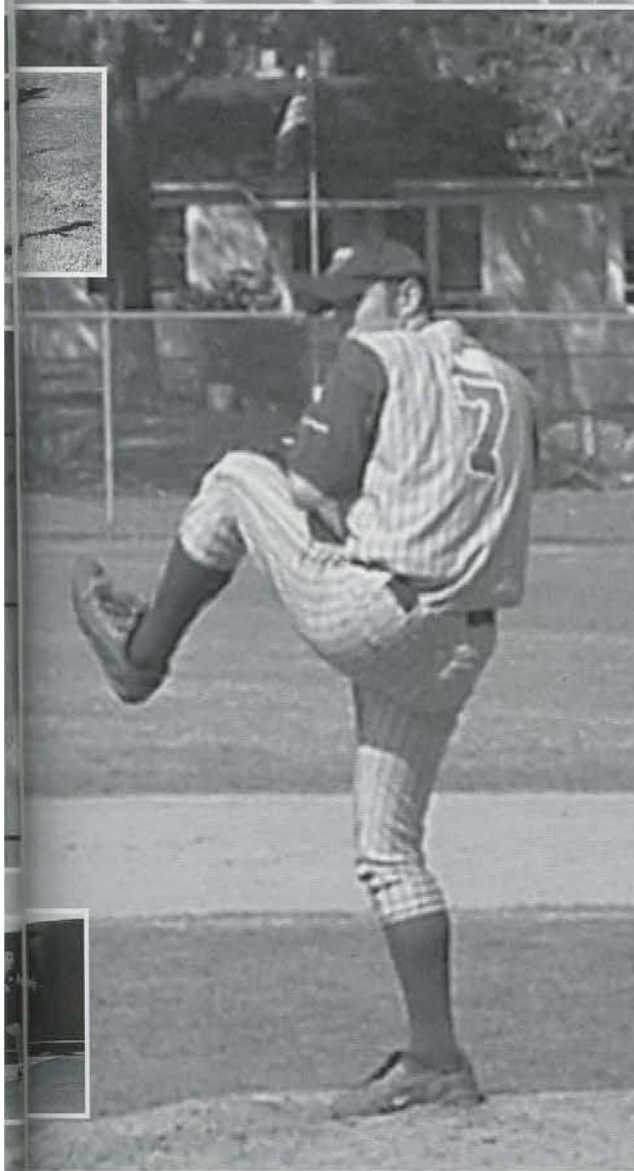

With only three players back from the 2000 squad and four freshmen in the starting line-up, Crown struggled to find a rhythm on the court. 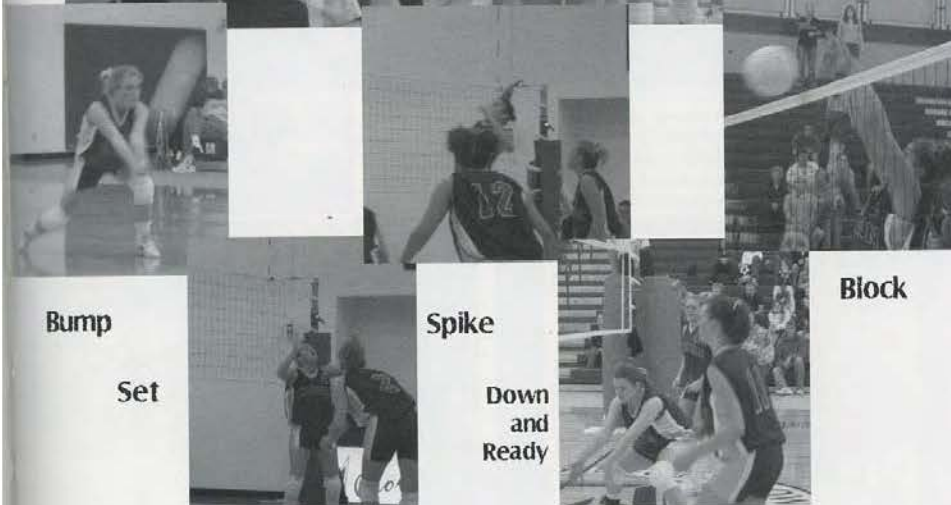

Despite their struggles to reach the win column, the Purple Storm continued to improve in each game of the season. Although the team was young (only six seniors), Crown stayed competitive and lost four games by less than a touchdown. Critical turnovers plagued the Storm all year and prevented chances of winning.

The Storm Defense shattered the school record for take-aways (interceptions and fumble recoveries) by recording 41 for the season. Sophomore Free Safety Ryan Greenberg set the pace with seven interceptions. Junior Linebacker Kyle Strickfaden led the defense with 82 tackles, while Senior Linebacker Burt Holloway and Sophomore Defensive Lineman David Chadwick recorded 5 sacks each. The defense will only get better, with eight starters returning and the addition of a strong recruiting class for 2002.

With the addition of an entirely new offensive system, the Storm struggled early in the season. However, the Offense continued to improve and executed better at the end of the season. Sophomore Running Back J.T. Trotter rushed for 1000 yards for the first time in school history, which makes him Crown's All-Time Leading Rusher. Receivers Seth Parise and Bill Bedford each led the team with 23 receptions. The Offense came together over the last five games and became a quality unit.

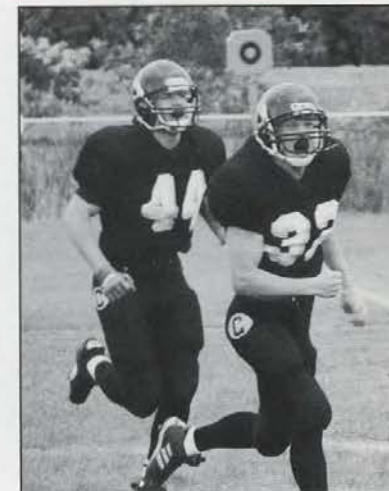

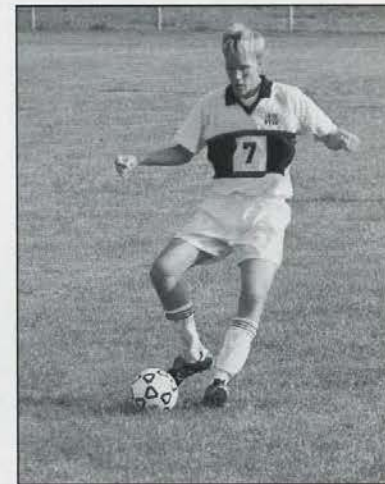

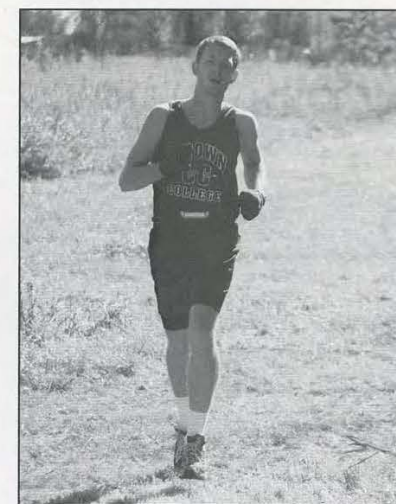

The Crown College Women's Basketball Team ended their season with a loss to Martin Luther College in UMAC play-offs on February 19, 2002. The previous weekend the team advanced to the Championship Round of the Regional Tournament but lost in an exciting overtime game to North Central University. The loss gave the Crown women a second place standing in the North Central Region of the NCCAA for the season.

Crown had a first round bye after earning the second place seed for the Regional Tournament due to their strong regular season record. The Storm met up with Trinity Bible College in the second round of the tournament on Friday, February 15. Crown began slow and fell behind 6-2 before settling down. Crown gradually took charge of the first half and entered the locker room with a 20-point cushion, leading 39-19 at the half.

Crown continued to dominate in the second half and eventually cruised to the 67-36 win over the Trinity Bible College Lions. Crown was led by Joylin Womeldorf, who scored 26 points and pulled down 10 rebounds for the game. Sara Kurka put up some strong numbers also with 20 points and 8 rebounds. Kasey Pust had 10 points and Becky Krats had 4 points, 6 assists, and 3 steals for the night.

On Saturday, February 16, Crown faced off against top seeded North Central University in the Championship Game of the Regional Tournament. The North Central Rams started strong and held the lead for the entire first half entering the locker room with the slim, 43-37 lead. Both teams shot over 60% in the half.

Crown jumped out quickly in the second half with a 6-0 run to tie the game at 43. The contest became a dogfight with neither team being able to get an advantage. Toward the end of the half, the Storm finally took a slight lead. With 17 seconds left on the clock Crown had possession of the ball and a three-point lead. Great defense by the Rams created a turnover, and Kati Shea of North Central University hit a clutch shot with two seconds left to keep her team alive and push the game into overtime, 68-68. 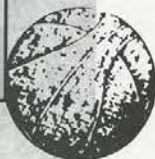

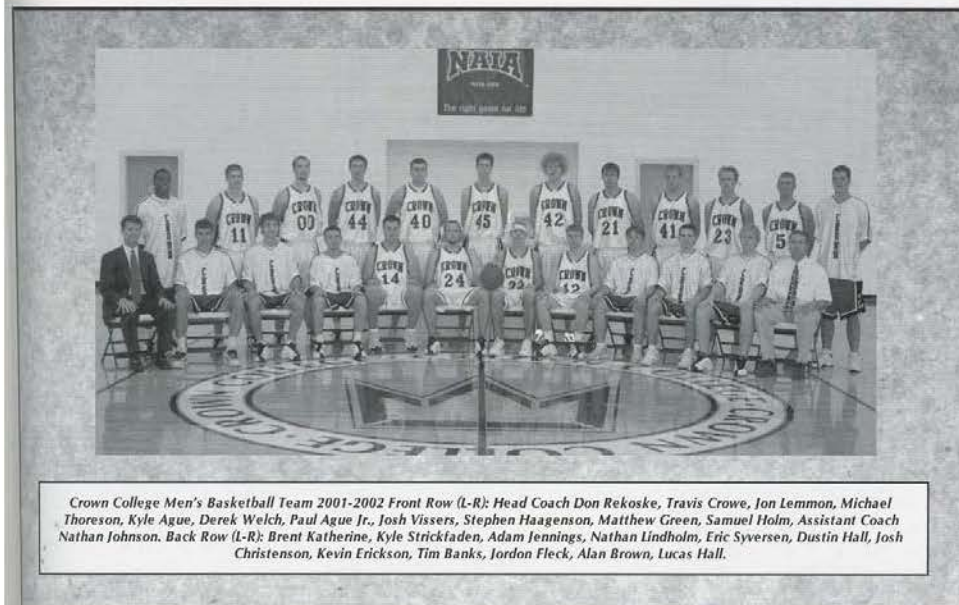

The Crown men's basketball team finished the 2001-2002 season with an overall record of 17-18 while earning their fifth trip to the NCCAA National Tournament in the past six years. In addition Crown finished third in the NAIA affiliated Upper Midwest Athletic Conference. This Crown Storm team was able to hold the number one ranking nationally in the NCCAA for the last four weeks of the regular season. Crown led the NCCAA in scoring defense and was in the top five nationally in field goal percentage defense. Crown also led the UMAC in field goal percent and turnovers during the season.

The team started slow due to several injuries to key players, but the team began to play well towards the end of the first semester. Crown defeated Dakota State University, Mid-America Bible College and Cincinnati Bible College (both NCCAA National Tournament teams) while narrowly losing to St. Olaf College just before the break.

Crown won seven of the first nine games second semester, which included three straight conference wins before losing a hard fought 64-60 game to Northwestern College which determined first place in the UMAC at the time. Crown won the NCCAA Regional Tournament on February 16, 2002, to advance to the National Tournament. Crown earned the number two seed for the Upper Midwest Athletic Conference play-offs but lost to Martin Luther College to end conference play. The Storm ended their season with three hard fought losses at the NCCAA national tournament, losing all three by a total of 9 points.

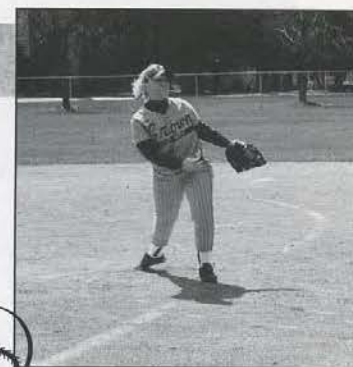

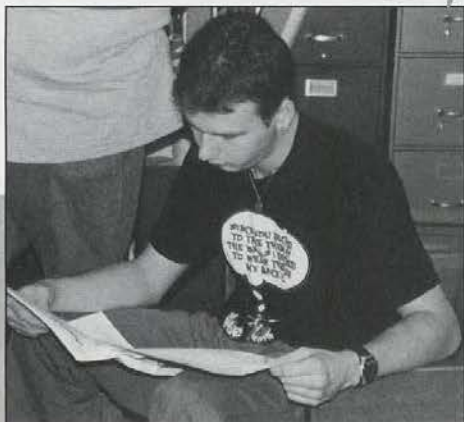

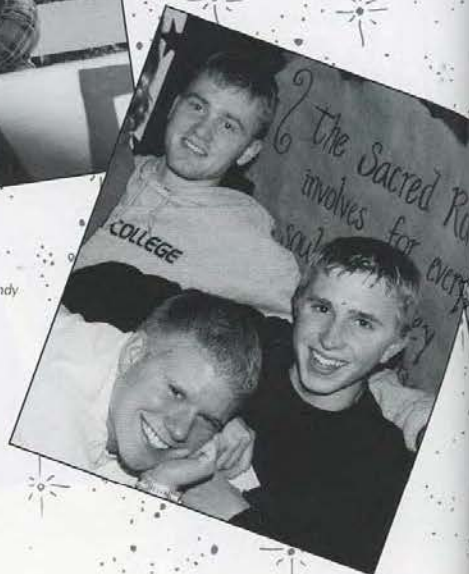

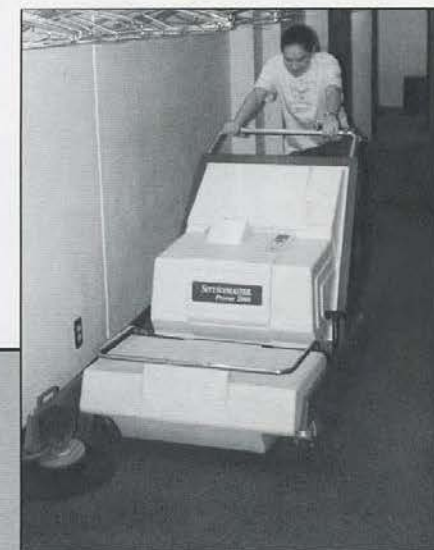
