The men's soccer team finished with a winning season of 11 wins and 10 losses. This was the second winning season the team has had since 1996. It was also the most wins in single season for the Storm since 1983. The program is clearly moving in the right direction. Junior Captain, Nathan Budish, led the team in assists with a total of six, and he also made the All-Conference First Team. Sophomore Jay Clementson protected Crown's net and achieved a record of 204 saves, saving over 86 percent of the shot attempts at the goal. After a successful season, the team will look to continue forward progress in years to come.

Rick Peterson was honored at the end of his first season as coach with 2 NCCAA All-Americans and a women's team that earned a 3rd place finish in both the UMAC Conference Meet and the NCCAA national meet.

The women's team was led by a pair of highly talented runners, senior Sara Spaulding from Anoka, MN and junior Jody Hempel from Spring Valley, MN. Spaulding and Hempel both earned UMAC All-Conference honors. Spaulding went on to finish runner-up in the NCCAA national meet in a school record time.

For the men, junior Seth Brickley from Mound, MN received NCCAA All American honors with a 3rd place finish at the NCCAA national meet that set a new school record for 8 K (26:57). Brickley was also runner-up in the UMAC conference meet.
"We had an exciting season," said Peterson. "Both Sara (Spaulding) and Seth (Brickley) came within 2 seconds of national championships. It was a very tight-knit group that supported one another throughout the season. We had a lot of fun and worked hard. All of the runners set personal best times. The team trusted God for results that seemed out of reach for most of the season."

On top of the baseball season's statistical leaders was freshman infielder Steve Boger batting .412 with three doubles, two triples, and a .515 slugging percentage. Boger joined the Storm after spring break. Junior infielder John Patnode was the Runs Batted In leader with 22 for the season in addition to a . 218 batting average in 28 games. Sophomore outfielder Jacob Jarvis was a perfect 21 for 21 in stolen bases in addition to his .247 batting average and .324 on base percentage. Ranking two and three for the Storm in batting averages were brothers Marshall and Winston Mullet. Marshall, the team's only senior, batted .293 with seven doubles, two triples and two homeruns in 29 games for Crown. He also added 11 Runs Batted In and 16 stolen bases to the offensive attack record of the Storm. Winston batted .250 and drew a team high of 12 walks earning a spot on the All-Conference Honorable Mention Team. Winston was also the team's top pitcher as he held the lowest team earned run average at 6.39 in 38 innings pitched with 33 strike outs. This baseball season was an improvement from last year's and the team earned a 5-26 overall record.
